Congratulations! I have fantastic news to share with you and your family: you are guaranteed admission at Allan Hancock College and can attend full-time for your first year absolutely TUITION FREE! The Hancock Promise is designed to help you achieve your educational and career goals!

The Hancock Promise is open to all students who enroll at Allan Hancock College immediately after graduating from a high school located in the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District. Students who are home-schooled or completed their GED through a local adult education program within the district (GED and HiSET graduates) are also eligible regardless of income, age, academic standing, or residency status.

As an Allan Hancock College Promise student, you will receive:

- Priority registration for classes
- Dozens of degree and certificate programs to choose from
- Dedicated academic counseling support
- Additional financial support to assist with transportation, books, and food
- Access to emergency aid funds
- The option to obtain an associate degree for guaranteed transfer into the California State University system to complete a four-year bachelor's degree

We realize that right now, you probably feel a little uncertain about your future. The COVID-19 public health emergency has changed many things, but two things it cannot change are your ability to successfully deal with unprecedented challenges and our unwavering commitment to help you successfully transition to college.

The Hancock Promise provides local high school graduates with a year of free tuition at Allan Hancock College! The Promise is open to all students who enroll at Hancock immediately after graduating from a high school located in the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District. Students who are home-schooled or completed their GED through a local adult education program within the district (GED and HiSET graduates) are also eligible.

BENEFITS FOR STUDENTS INCLUDE:

- More than \$1,200 in tuition and fees during first year at Allan Hancock College
- Early registration for classes
- Personalized counseling for academic success
- Free tutoring and other academic support services

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Enroll at Hancock immediately after graduating from a high school located within the district (Includes public, charter, private or home schools)
- Complete financial aid applications
- Register for a minimum of 12 units in both fall and spring semesters at Hancock
- Maintain a 2.0 grade point average in the fall in order to be eligible for the Promise in the spring semester
- Complete one English and one math class during the first year at AHC if required by the program of study

THE HANCOCK PROMISE

The Hancock Promise provides 2021 graduates from high schools or adult schools within the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District with the opportunity to get their first year FREE of tuition.*

1 COMPLETE THE ONLINE ADMISSION APPLICATION

Starting October 1, 2020

Visit www.hancockcollege.edu/apply/cccaply.php to get started. Select summer **OR** fall 2021.

To complete the application, you will need:

- A copy of your current high school transcript. Placement for math and English is based on high school GPA.
- Your Social Security Number or permanent resident card. If you do not have either, leave this section of the application blank.
- Your chosen major at AHC. Visit our Areas of Interest webpage at www.hancockcollege.edu/departments for a list of our current associate degrees, transfer degrees, and certificates.
- An email address (please do not use your high school email address). If you or your parents do not have an email address, please sign up for one at yahoo.com or gmail.com before you get started.

Your AHC student ID (H#) and your username will be sent to the email address that you used to apply within 24-36 hours. Be sure to keep both of these in a safe place. Your AHC student ID (H#) will be used throughout your time at AHC.

2 COMPLETE THE ONLINE FAFSA OR DREAM ACT APPLICATION

Starting October 1, 2020

To ensure that you are considered for the maximum federal and state financial aid grants you **MUST** apply by Tuesday, March 2, 2021.

Attend a Cash for College event to receive assistance in completing either application.

- Complete the FAFSA, visit www.fafsa.gov **OR** complete the CA Dream Act, visit <https://dream.csac.ca.gov>

To complete either application, you will need the following if applicable:

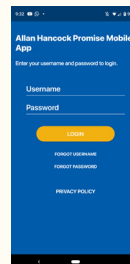
- Student & Parent/Adoptive Parents' Social Security Number (SSN) if you have one
- Student & Parent/Adoptive Parents' 2019 W-2's & 2019 tax returns
- Student & Parent/Adoptive Parents' records of untaxed income such as welfare benefits, SS benefits, or child support payments
- Student & Parent/Adoptive Parents' birthdates
- Student & Parent/Adoptive Parents' personal email address

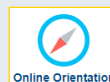


3 COMPLETE THE ONLINE ORIENTATION

Starting November 2, 2020

4 ATTEND A LAUNCH TO COLLEGE EVENT OR MEET WITH AN AHC COUNSELOR Starting March 2021

- Check the AHC Promise website for current Launch to College dates & information: www.hancockcollege.edu/promise
- You may also see your high school's counseling team for more information **OR** check with your AHC campus representative to sign up.
- Attend a Launch to College event to complete your summer and/or fall 2021 semester education plan (SEP).
- If you are unable to attend a Launch to College event, please schedule an appointment to meet with a Hancock counselor by calling 805-922-6966 ext. 3293 before April 23, 2021. You will need your education plan (SEP) which will list the classes that you should register for in the summer and/or fall semesters.

Congratulations! You have completed steps 1-4. You are now a **Hancock Promise** student!

CHECK YOUR FINANCIAL AID STATUS BEFORE YOU REGISTER

- Go to [HancockCollege.edu](http:// HancockCollege.edu) and log in to your **myHancock portal** 
- Scroll down to "My Financial Aid" and click "View My Financial Aid" 
- Choose the Award Year: "**Summer 2021 to Spring 2022**". You will see your unsatisfied requirement/documents.
- If you have a Financial Aid Task (unsatisfied requirements), you will need to create an account before you can continue. Use your last name, as reported on your FAFSA when creating your account.
- Double click on each of the required items and complete each task/document listed. You may need to print, scan, and upload and submit these documents. If you are not able to upload, email these completed and signed documents to finaid@ HancockCollege.edu

You will need to complete and submit all of the required documents before you can be awarded any additional financial aid grants for the summer 2021, fall 2021, and spring 2022 semesters.

5 REGISTER FOR CLASSES Starting April 28, 2021

Now that you are a Hancock Promise student, it's time to register for summer and/or fall 2021 classes.

- Go to [HancockCollege.edu](http:// HancockCollege.edu) and log in to your **myHancock portal**
- Scroll down to "Register Add/Drop Classes"
- When you register, have your first semester education plan (SEP) available. If you need a copy, you can obtain one by logging into myHancock portal and clicking on "Degree Works".
- You **MUST** register for a minimum of 12 units for the fall 2021 AND spring 2022 semesters. There is **NO** minimum unit requirement if you attend summer 2021.
- You **MUST** register and complete one English and one math class during the summer, fall, or spring semester, if required by your program of study (major).

If you have any registration questions, please call Admissions & Records at 805-922-6966 ext. 3248; if you have questions regarding the classes you should register for, please call Counseling at 805-922-6966 ext. 3293.

Priority registration for Promise students is only available upon completion of Steps 1-4; otherwise registration opens to new students on May 1, 2021.

6 COMPLETE A COMPREHENSIVE STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN (SEP) June - October 2021

- An SEP is a semester-by-semester plan listing all the courses you will need to complete in order to reach your educational goal. You will need to have this completed before registration for the spring 2022 semester begins, which is usually in early November. To schedule a **SEP appointment** with a counselor, please call 805-922-6966 ext. 3293.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Enroll at AHC immediately after graduating from high school (includes public, charter, private or home schools) **OR** adult schools located within the AHJCC district.

- Complete the FAFSA or CDAA.
- Register and complete a minimum of 12 units in both fall and spring semesters. There is **NO** minimum unit requirement if you attend summer school.
- Maintain a 2.0 grade point average in the fall semester in order to be eligible for the Promise in the spring semester.
- Complete one English and one math class during the summer/fall 2021 or spring 2022 semesters at AHC, if required by the program of study.

The priority timelines shown above have been developed to ensure that students will have maximum access to priority registration services at AHC for summer & fall 2021, be awarded the Hancock Promise Award before they register (no fees/tuition will need to be paid), and have financial aid resources (funds to pay for books and supplies) available to them when the semester begins. Completion of these steps after these priority timelines will still be accepted and processed on a first-come, first-serve basis from October 2020-September 2021.

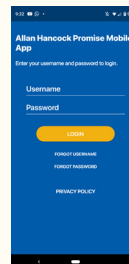

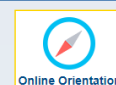

6 COMPLETE UN PLAN EDUCATIVO ESTUDIANTIL (SEP) junio-octubre 2021

Necesitará tener este plan ya completo antes de que empiecen las inscripciones para el semestre de primavera del 2022, que regularmente abre a principios de noviembre.

Requisitos de Elegibilidad

Inscríbese de forma inmediata en AHC al graduarse de la 'high school' (incluye escuelas 'charter' privadas o de enseñanza en casa) O escuelas de adultos que se encuentran ubicadas dentro del distrito de AHC.

- Complete la solicitud FAFSA o CDAA
- Inscríbese en un mínimo de 12 unidades en cada semestre, otoño y primavera. NO hay un mínimo de unidades requeridas si decide asistir a clases durante el verano.
- Mantenga un promedio de calificaciones de 2.0 en el semestre de otoño para poder ser elegible a la 'Promesa de Hancock' durante el semestre de primavera.
- Complete en AHC una clase de matemáticas y una de inglés durante el semestre del verano/otoño 2020 o primavera 2021, si así lo requiere su programa de estudio.

*Todos los pasos de la 'Promesa de Hancock' deben de ser completados al más tardar a principios del semestre de otoño del 2021. Las fechas de prioridad que se muestran arriba se han desarrollado para asegurar que los estudiantes tengan el máximo acceso posible para los servicios de inscripción con prioridad en AHC para el verano y otoño del 2021 y puedan recibir los beneficios de la Promesa de Hancock antes de que se inscriban (no tendrán que pagar cuotas ni pagos de inscripción) y puedan como resultado contar con los recursos de ayuda financiera (fondos para pagar libros y materiales) a tiempo para antes de que comience el semestre.

FAQ'S – HANCOCK PROMISE AND GENERAL COLLEGE STUDENTS

What is the Hancock Promise?

The Hancock Promise provides any local student who completes their high school education within the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District (AHJCC) with the opportunity to get their first year of tuition free at Allan Hancock College. Qualified students will not have to pay tuition or lab and class fees.

What specifically does the Hancock Promise pay for?

The Hancock Promise will cover tuition (at least 12 units/semester), health fee (\$20/semester), Student Center fee (\$10/semester), course materials fees, and the Student Representative fee (\$1/semester). The Promise saves each student more than \$1,200. It does not include books, school supplies, or the parking permit fee.

Where does the funding for the Hancock Promise come from?

Funding for the Hancock Promise comes entirely from private donations from generous members of the community.

What if I attended high school in the AHJCC District, but transferred out of the district before graduation? Do I qualify?

Unfortunately, the Promise only applies to students who graduated from a high school within the district.

I didn't graduate from high school. Instead, I have my GED/went to adult high school/passed the California High School Proficiency Exam in the AHJCC District. Do I qualify?

Yes, you qualify. As long as you completed high school within the district during the academic year and immediately completed your AHC application, you are eligible.

I was home schooled. Do I qualify?

Yes, you qualify. As long as you completed high school within the district during the academic year and immediately completed your AHC application, you are eligible. So are students who completed a GED through a local adult education program within the district (GED and HiSET graduates).

I'm not a citizen of the United States.

Do I qualify?

Undocumented students, whether AB540-eligible or not, are eligible for the AHC Promise, as long as they graduate from a district high school and immediately enroll at AHC.

I'm getting other scholarships.

Do I qualify?

Yes, you still qualify. Any other scholarships will complement the Promise. Please contact the Financial Aid office for more information at 1-805-922-6966 ext. 3200.

How soon after high school graduation must I enroll? Are there any exceptions?

You must enroll at AHC for the summer or fall semester immediately following graduation from high school or the equivalent. If entering military service or missionary service directly out of high school, please contact us at promise@hancockcollege.edu.

How many units do I need to take each regular (fall/spring) semester? What if the program I'm participating in is designed to be part-time?

You must complete at least 12 units at AHC each semester for a total of 24 units in an academic year. Exceptions may be made in some cases.

Are there any GPA requirements?

There are no requirements on your incoming high school GPA. However, students must maintain a 2.0 GPA during the fall semester at AHC in order to qualify as a Promise student during the following spring semester.

I'm not a senior this school year. Will I be able to get the Promise in the future?

Yes! The Promise is made possible by generous gifts from the community to the Allan Hancock College Foundation. The foundation established the Hancock Promise Endowment Fund so that the Hancock Promise will be around for future generations of high school graduates in the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District.

I was eligible but didn't sign up for the Promise originally. I went to another college in the fall, can I register as a Promise student at AHC in the spring?

Unfortunately, no. The Hancock Promise is only for first-time college students.

What is the deadline to apply?

You must complete the checklist by August to start fall classes as a Promise student. You will need to complete steps 1-5 by May in order to receive priority registration for summer and fall classes. Registration for both terms begins in May.

Do Promise students receive priority registration? When is priority registration for Promise students?

Yes, Promise students receive priority registration at AHC, which means they get to sign up for classes earlier than the majority of other students. See list of registration dates to find out when you can register.

Are the summer and winter sessions included?

Yes. The Promise covers the cost of tuition and fees for up to 30 units in the academic year, which runs from the summer immediately after high school graduation to the following May.

I live in southern San Luis Obispo County (Arroyo Grande/Nipomo), can I still qualify for the Hancock Promise?

While your tuition and fees at Hancock may not be covered by the Hancock Promise, there is still an opportunity to have it taken care of through different financial aid opportunities available at Hancock. After completion of the FAFSA and other financial aid applications (California Promise, Pell Grant, FA Scholarships and EOPS), high school graduates may still find their enrollment fees and tuition covered. - Do not assume you don't qualify for financial aid. In fact, one out of two applicants receives financial assistance.
- Applying for financial aid is free! Simply complete the form online at www.fafsa.gov
- For maximum financial award, apply by March 2 of every year. You can still apply after that date and anytime throughout the year.
- Types of Financial Aid:

Grants: funds for college, based on financial need, that do not require repayment.

Loans: money borrowed at a low interest rate that requires repayment after leaving college or falling below half-time enrollment.

Scholarships: funds for college that do not require repayment.

California College Promise Grant (formerly known as BOG Fee Waiver): waives your enrollment fees at a California community college.

Once you've qualified for the California College Promise Grant, you must maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher and complete more than 50 percent of your coursework in order to avoid losing it.

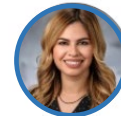

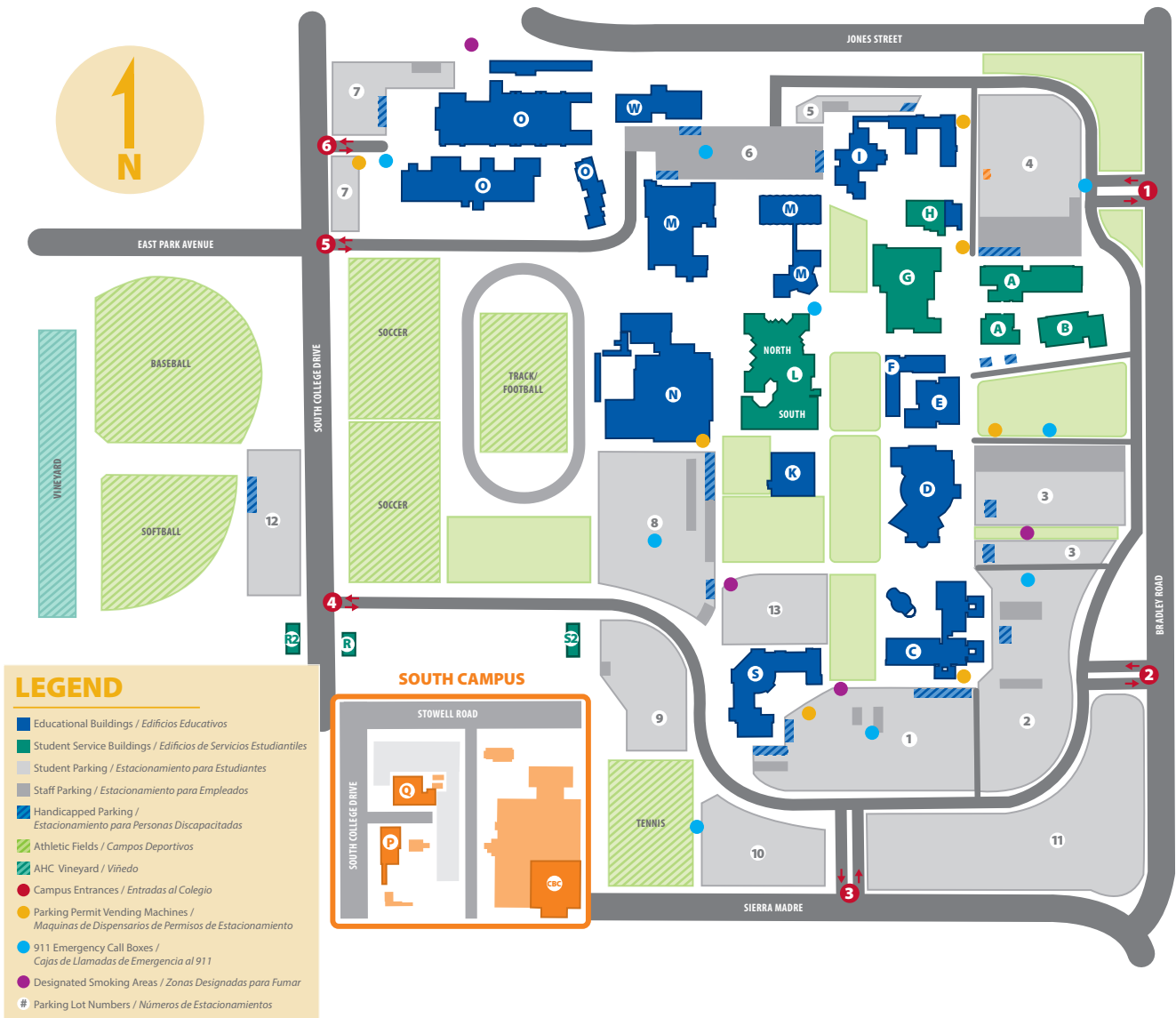
