#### 11.A. California Mini-Corps

Jessica Duarte, Program Coordinator, California Mini-Corps, provided an update on the California Mini-Corps Program. Ms. Duarte provided the history on how the program came to be. She explained what the objectives of the program are, how it helps migrant students, and what constitutes a migrant student. She also explained the qualifications to be a student tutor. She noted one of the program's goals is diversify the teacher workforce. She shared the components of the program which include regular school year program, summer indoor program, 54 hours of staff development that includes classroom management, lesson design, workshops on bullying, technology use, water and fire safety. Carolina Heredia and Patty Ramos, former migrant tutors, shared how their experiences as migrant tutors helped them and local students.

### 13. Oral Reports

### 13.A. Superintendent/President's Report

Dr. Walthers reported representatives for the Santa Ynez Valley High School have expressed an interest in moving the college's Solvang Center. He attended a student organized campus unity meeting to discuss student concerns as a result of the presidential election. He provided a health update on former Trustee Grennan. He said the last step in the accreditation process is to respond to the four recommendations in the accreditation report. Assessment is the ongoing process of analyzing student academic achievements compared to expected outcomes. Student work may be used as part of the assessment process and will be anonymous. # GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR AN ASSOCIATE DEGREE

Allan Hancock College offers four types of associate degrees. In addition to the associate in arts (AA) and associate in science (AS) degrees, Allan Hancock College as of fall 2011 offers associate in arts for transfer (AA-T) and associate in science for transfer (AS-T) degrees. (See the section for Graduation Requirements for the Associate Degree for Transfer following this section)

#### **AA and AS Degrees**

The associate in arts (AA) degree is designed for the student desiring a lower-division preparation experience in order to transfer to a four-year public or private university or college. The associate in science (AS) degree is designed for the occupationally-oriented student and provides training within specific occupational areas. In some areas of study the associate in science (AS) degree **may** also provide lower-division preparation experience for transfer to a four-year university or college.

The associate in arts (AA) and associate in science (AS) degrees require the completion of all Allan Hancock College graduation requirements and specified major degree requirements. Students planning to transfer to a four-year institution and desire an associate degree (AA or AS), **but who are not** completing an associate degree for transfer (AA-T or AS-T) will also have to complete all the Allan Hancock College graduation requirements and specific major degree requirements. Transfer students should refer to the "Transfer Information" section in this catalog.

All students who desire the associate in arts (AA) or association in science (AS) degree and have satisfied the graduation requirements listed below must apply for the appropriate associate degree even though they may be planning to transfer to a four-year institution.

**NOTE:** The deadline to apply for an associate degree is published on Allan Hancock College's website in the "At a Glance Class Schedule"

An associate in arts and/or associate in science degree will be awarded when the following requirements have been met:

- A MINIMUM OF 60 UNITS have been completed satisfactorily. A maximum of 12 units of workshop and no more than 16 units of P graded courses can be applied toward an AA/AS degree. Only 100 and 300 level courses will apply to the AA or AS degree.
- A GRADE POINT AVERAGE OF 2.0 or better has been earned for all college work attempted.
- 3. **AN APPLICATION** has been filed in the Admissions and Records office by the published deadline.
- A MINIMUM OF 12 UNITS toward the degree have been completed at Allan Hancock College (Title 5, Section 55802).
- 5. A MINIMUM OF 2 COURSES IN HEALTH AND WELLNESS (3.5 Units)

The purpose of the Health and Wellness graduation requirement is to promote awareness and understanding of the significance/importance of the lifelong-process of actively

increasing the quality of one's decision making such that it leads towards a more positive, comprehensive state of well-being, beyond a state of merely being free from illness, injury, and/or disease. (Not required for Associate in Art for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) Degrees.)

**NOTE:** Students should consult a counselor to see if Math 309 is best for them. STEM majors and others who intend to take Math 121 or higher, should take Math 331.

 A MINIMUM OF THREE UNITS IN MULTICULTURAL/ GENDER STUDIES have been completed. (Not required for Associate in Art for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) Degrees.)

The purpose of the Multicultural/Gender Studies graduation requirement is to promote our students' awareness about, their understanding and appreciation of, and their respect for underrepresented groups and ethnic minorities. Courses that

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are designated as fulfilling this requirement are designed to help students link their personal experiences and their education to broader cultural perspectives, to expand their awareness of their own cultural heritage, and to encourage in them the skills of cultural competence which can foster the meaningful communication and connection needed in global heterogeneous societies.

# GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ASSOCIATE DEGREE for TRANSFER

The associate in arts for transfer (AA-T) and associate in science for transfer (AS-T), are intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree in a similar major at a CSU campus. Students completing the AA-T or AS-T degrees are guaranteed admission to the CSU system, but not to a particular campus or major. These degrees may not be the best option for students intending to transfer to a particular CSU campus or to a university or college that is not part of the CSU system. Students should consult with a counselor when planning to

complete an associate degree for transfer and/or for more information on university admission requirements.

## **AA-T and AS-T Degrees**

The associate degree for transfer requires the completion of the California State University General Education pattern (CSU GE) or the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) pattern as well as the specific AA-T or AS-T major requirements. Students applying for an associate degree for transfer are required to complete the Allan Hancock College graduation requirements except for the following areas:

Health and Wellness Multicultural/Gender Studies AHC General Education Categories

Students interested in pursuing an associate degree for transfer should work with a counselor to identify major degree coursework that can be utilized to fulfill both the CSU GE or the IGETC transfer general education pattern and the specific associate degree for transfer major requirements.

Students who are planning to complete an associate degree for transfer to the California State University system must apply for the appropriate associate in arts for transfer (AA-T) or associate in science for transfer (AS-T) degree in order to be eligible for the CSU admissions priority status associated with the transfer degrees on the following pages.

The associate in arts for transfer (AA-T) or associate in science for transfer (AS-T) degree will be awarded when the following graduation requirements have been met:

- A MINIMUM OF 60 UNITS have been completed satisfactorily. A maximum of 12 units of workshop and no more than 16 units of P graded courses can be applied toward an AA-T/AS-T degree. Only 100 level courses will apply to the degree.
- 2. **A GRADE POINT AVERAGE OF 2.0** or better has been earned for all college work attempted.
- AN APPLICATION for an associate degree for transfer has been filed in the Admissions and Records office by the published deadline.
- 4. **A MINIMUM OF 12 UNITS** toward the degree have been completed at Allan Hancock College (Title 5, Section 55802).
- COMPETENCY IN READING, WRITTEN EXPRESSION AND MATHEMATICS has been demonstrated.

Students will demonstrate competence in reading by completing the general education transfer requirements.

Students will demonstrate competence in written expression by completing English 101 (grade C or higher).

Students will demonstrate competence in mathematics by meeting one of the following standards:

- A. Pass with a C or higher any 100-level math course of at least three units.
- B. Receive a math placement recommendation for any 100-level math course based on the current Allan Hancock START process.
- 6. MAJOR: A MINIMUM of 18 UNITS has been completed in an AA-T or AS-T degree major. See the AA-T/AS-T degree sheets in counseling or consult the appropriate page in this catalog for specific degree requirements. A minimum of 25 percent of the units required in the major must be

completed at Allan Hancock College. A grade of C or higher is necessary in each course used to complete the major.

GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER PATTERN: Completion of either the California State University General Education (CSU GE) pattern or the Intersegmental General Education Curriculum (IGETC) pattern (see Transfer Information section).

CSU GE NOTE: CSU GE transfer applicants must complete a minimum of 30 semester units including Area A and B4 on this pattern with a grade of C or better in each course (C- is not acceptable). Since there are a total of 39 units of CSU lower-division GE required for certification, the remaining 9 units may be taken for a passing grade (D- or better).

IGETC NOTE: Students completing an AA-T or AS-T, following the IGETC pattern, and transferring to CSU, must complete an IGETC Area 1 C Oral Communication course. All IGETC courses must be completed with a grade of C or better (C- is not acceptable).

IGETC NOTE: Students completing an AA-T or AS-T, following the IGETC pattern, and transferring to a UC, California Independent, or out-of-state university don't have to complete an IGETC Area 1C Oral Communication course. All IGETC courses must be completed with a grade of C or better (C- is not acceptable).

## APPLICATION PROCEDURES FOR THE ASSOCIATE DEGREE (AA, AS, AA-T, or AS-T)

- All students must file an application in order to receive a degree. The Application for a Degree form is available at the counseling office, the Vandenberg AFB and Lompoc Valley Centers. The starting date to apply for graduation is the first day of classes; closing dates for filing are listed in the college calendar, and on the college Web site.
- All students applying for an associate degree must first see a counselor for a preliminary requirement check. The application must have the signature of a counselor before it will be accepted for final evaluation by the Admissions and Records office.
- All course requirements must be completed on or before the final day of classes for the semester in which the student files an application.
- 4. External courses, grades, and units used to meet requirements for the associate degree must be from an accredited college/university. Official copies of all transcripts from other colleges attended must be on file in the Allan Hancock College Admissions and Records office before an application can be evaluated.
- Students are notified in writing of their graduation status by the Admissions and Records office, only if there is a deficiency.
- Diplomas are mailed within three months of the end date of the semester in which the degree was earned.

Students who do not satisfy the requirements for the degree for which they have applied must submit a new application during a later filing period.

#### **CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS**

Allan Hancock College offers two types of certificate programs, Certificate of Achievement and Certificate of Accomplishment. A Certificate of Achievement has been approved by the state and will be posted on the student's transcript. A Certificate of Accomplishment will be posted on to the student's permanent record, but not on the student's transcript. Certificate programs include only those courses that have a direct bearing upon specialized occupational competencies. For this reason there is no general education requirement in a certificate program.

#### **Application Procedures**

- Students must file an application in order to receive a certificate. Applications are obtained on the Admissions and Records public webpage.
- Students who have only attended AHC may submit the application to Admissions and Records.
- Students who have attended another college or university must meet with a counselor to complete the application.
- All required courses must have been completed by the end of the semester in which the student submits an application.
- 5. A grade of C or better is necessary in all required courses.
- 6. A minimum of 25 percent of the units required for the certificate must be completed at Allan Hancock College.
- 7. Official copies of all transcripts from other colleges attended must be on file in the Allan Hancock College counseling office.
- External transcripts become the property of Allan Hancock College. Transcripts submitted to AHC will not be released to students, other colleges or agencies.
- Certificates are mailed within three months of the end of the semester in which the certificate was earned. Students who do not satisfy the requirements for the certificate for which they have applied must submit a new application during a later filing period.

## PROFICIENCY VERIFICATION

A verification of proficiency may be issued to a student to validate the performance of a specific skill at a prescribed level. Students should contact the department chair for further information as to what verifications are available and the specific requirements in each area.

## **CATALOG RIGHTS**

Graduation requirements for an Associate's Degree or vocational certificates are determined according to the Catalog in effect at the time of initial enrollment. In order to maintain catalog rights, a student must be in continuous enrollment during each successive academic year. For purposes of catalog rights, the academic year begins each summer and ends the subsequent spring session. To maintain continuous enrollment, a student must attend at least one credit class in an academic year.

Students must apply for graduation within three years from the date all requirements are satisfied. It is important to note that:

- Students who maintain continuous enrollment at Allan Hancock College, or students who are continuing at another accredited institution within the United States are eligible to graduate from AHC under the catalog in effect at the time they first enrolled at Allan Hancock College.
- Students who stop attending AHC for a year or longer are eligible to graduate from AHC under the catalog in effect the semester the student re-enters Allan Hancock College again.
   One year is defined as one academic year. The student must maintain continuous enrollment thereafter.
- 3. If a student attends another college after they have not attended Allan Hancock College for a year or longer, and does not re-enroll at Allan Hancock College, they are eligible to graduate from Allan Hancock College under the catalog in effect the semester they petition to graduate. One year is defined as one academic year.

Exceptions to the above policy may be made by the director, Admissions and Records, for medical reasons or for military service.

#### PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Programs of study leading to an associate in arts degree, associate in science degree, associate in arts for transfer, associate in science for transfer, or certificate are listed alphabetically on the pages that follow. Programs which lead to four-year universities and transfer, do not necessarily reflect the transfer requirements of specific schools. If a student wishes to receive an associate degree in a specific discipline, the requirements as set forth must be met; however, if planning to complete a program for transfer, students should note that transfer requirements for both the major and general education vary widely. It is recommended that the students review the college catalog of the university to which they plan to transfer and consult with an Allan Hancock College counselor to complete an educational plan in planning transfer objectives.

TECH PREP - Tech Prep is a carefully designed curriculum that engages students in a four-year program (two years of high school and two years of community college) to gain the knowledge, skills and values required for technical careers. A Tech Prep education (1) leads to an associate degree or certificate, (2) provides technical preparation, (3) builds student competence in mathematics, science, and communications through a sequential course of study, and (4) leads to placement in related employment or additional training. Tech Prep programs and courses are identified throughout the descriptions of degrees and announcement of courses.

### **AGRIBUSINESS: VITICULTURE** (A.S. & Certificate of Achievement)

### **ANNOUNCEMENT OF COURES**

#### **COURSE INFORMATION**

Students should familiarize themselves with the information given below about the course descriptions. Courses are listed alphabetically. Each course is designated by a prefix and number. A descriptive title and the unit value follow the course number. The semester in which the course is usually offered is noted at the end of the course description following the grading option. See the key at the end of this section.

**Numbering System:** Courses numbered 100-199 are baccalaureate-level courses and will transfer to the California State University system and other four-year institutions. Please note that some of these courses would not be appropriate for specific majors or for the general education requirements for graduation. Students should check the current catalog of the institution of transfer to determine which courses are appropriate.

**Courses numbered 300-399** are intended for certificate and associate degree programs. In some cases, with special arrangements, they may be acceptable for transfer to some four-year universities.

**Courses numbered 400-499** are primarily vocational credit courses that are not applicable to the associate degree programs and do not transfer to four-year institutions.

**Courses numbered 500-599** are college preparatory in nature and are not applicable to the associate degree programs and do not transfer to four-year institutions.

Cooperative Work Experience (149/302): Cooperative Work Experience courses provide on-the-job learning related to a student's educational or occupational goals, and are offered by numerous disciplines. See "Cooperative Work Experience" for a more complete description.

Experimental Courses (179, 379, 479, and 579): Formerly known as "Workshop," these courses are designed in specific disciplines to test new curriculum before adopting it as part of an academic program. See "Experimental Courses" for a more complete description of the concept.

**Independent Projects (189/389):** These courses are academic opportunities for students who are capable of independent work and who demonstrate the need or desire for additional study beyond the regular curriculum. See "Independent Projects" for a more complete description of the concept.

Special Topics Courses (199/399/499/599): Formerly known as "Institutes" or "Topics In," these courses are designed to meet specific and unique curriculum need within the college's service area. These courses address a specific topic relating to a discipline and are not offered on a regular cycle (not within a two-year period). These courses are not included in any major core.

#### Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID)

The Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID) is a statewide numbering system independent from the course numbers assigned by local California community colleges. A C-ID number next to a course signals that participating California colleges and universities have determined that courses offered by other California community colleges are comparable in content and scope to courses offered on their own campuses, regardless of their unique titles or local course number. Thus, if a schedule of classes or catalog lists a course bearing a C-ID number, for example COMM 110, students at that college can be assured that it will be accepted in lieu of a course bearing the C-ID

COMM 110 designation at another community college. In other words, the C-ID designation can be used to identify comparable courses at different community colleges. However, students should always go to <a href="https://www.assist.org">www.assist.org</a> to confirm how each college's course will be accepted at a particular four-year college or university for transfer credit. The C-ID numbering system is useful for students attending more than one community college and is applied to many of the transferable courses students need as preparation for transfer. Because these course requirements may change and because courses may be modified and qualified for or deleted from the C-ID database, students should always check with a counselor to determine how C-ID designated courses fit into their educational plans for transfer. Students may consult the ASSIST database at <a href="https://www.assist.org">www.assist.org</a> for specific information on C-ID course designations. Counselors can always

Courses so designated will provide for increasing competency levels of performance in intercollegiate athletics, preparation for a bachelor's degree in specific majors, or preparation for non-athletic intercollegiate or vocational competitions. Please check this catalog for identification of course repeatability.

**Course Requirements:** Course descriptions include skill requirements or recommended levels of preparation as follows:

Prerequisite: A prerequisite is a course (or equivalent skills or prior experience) that a student must complete with a grade of "C" or better (or possess) before enrolling in a more advanced course. A prerequisite is a course needed before a student may register for a subsequent course. If a student believes the prerequisite has been met by other means, an appeal for prerequisite equivalency can be filed with the dean of counseling and matriculation. Deadlines for submission of an appeal are printed in the Prerequisites, Requisites and Advisories link on myHancock at

http://www.hancockcollege.edu/Default.asp?Page=501. NOTE regarding equivalent enrollment eligibility for state regulatory and licensing authorities: Approval of equivalent course or prior experience used to satisfy enrollment eligibility is not a guarantee that state regulatory and licensing authorities will also grant equivalency for licensure or employment purposes.

Requisite: A corequisite is a course that must be taken prior to or at the same time the student is enrolling in the desired course. Deadlines for submission of an appeal are printed in the Prerequisites, Corequisites and Advisories link on myHancock at http://www.hancockcollege.edu/Default.asp?Page=501.

**Advisory:** An advisory is a course that a student is encouraged, but not required, to take before enrolling in a more advanced course. The advisory course will, in all likelihood, enhance a student's learning in the advanced course.

**Limitation on enrollment:** Enrollment is subject to limitations based on reasons of:

- 1. health and safety; or
- in cases of intercollegiate competition or public performance courses, allocation of available seats to those students judged most qualified and providing such courses are not core requirements for a major or a general education requirement for which there is no other course available; or
- one or more sections of a course are limited to a cohort of students when other sections of the same course are available for open enrollment.

To Be Arranged (TBA) Courses: Some courses have "to be arranged" (TBA) components and/or may be offered via distance learning (DL). TBA components require participation in a minimum number of hours each week (for semester length courses), or minimum number of hours each day (for shorter terms), in addition to the scheduled days and times designated in the schedule of classes. Regular participation is required of all students in courses with TBA components and/or classes offered via distance learning. **Field Trips:** Certain courses have field trips scheduled as a regular part of the course. Some of these trips are scheduled for the evening, and some for Saturdays or other days when the college is not usually in session. These trips are scheduled far enough in advance to give the student ample time for planning. Unless specifically advised otherwise, students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to and from the class site. ### **AGRIBUSINESS**

#### AG 318 Advanced Winemaking

3 units

Prerequisite: AG 101

Limitation on enrollment: Must be 21 years or older at the time of

taking class.

Students will receive an advanced background in winemaking, in a lecture setting. Relevant winemaking issues are analyzed and discussed. The course will cover the principles of viticulture for winemaking, wine chemistry, principles and practices of making standard types of wines, with special reference to methods of vinification and stability. A brief discussion of winemaking costs and alternatives is presented. (GR/P/NP) (A)

### **ASTRONOMY**

#### ASTR 121 Elementary Astronomy Lab 1 unit

Acceptable for credit: CSU, UC

Corequisite: ASTR 100 or completion of ASTR 100

A laboratory course emphasizing practice and interpretation of astronomical observations for students that are concurrently taking the ASTR 100 lecture course or those that have previously passed it with a grade of "C" or higher. When weather permits, students will observe objects in the sky with and without instruments such as telescopes. Inclass simulations will be substituted when direct observation is not possible. The moon, stars, constellations, planets and other solar system bodies, and various deep-sky objects will be studied as well as the methods used to catalog, chart, and find them.. (F, S) (GR/P/NP)

### **COSMETOLOGY**

#### COS 303 Intermediate Cosmetology

9 units

Prerequisite: COS 301 with grade C or higher

Provides students with advanced laboratory and salon experience in the field of cosmetology and related sciences. Includes theories and practices in hair styling, permanent waving, chemical straightening, haircutting, hair coloring and bleaching, scalp and hair treatments, facials, eyebrow arching and hair removal, makeup, manicuring and pedicuring. Students are required by the State Board of Cosmetology to complete COS 301 and COS 302 A - C for a total of 1,600 hours in order to qualify to take the licensure examination and become eligible to practice as a cosmetologist. (GR) (F, S)

#### **COS 304 Advanced Cosmetology**

9 units

Prerequisite: COS 301 with grade C or higher

Provides students with advanced laboratory and salon experience in the field of cosmetology and related sciences. Includes theories and practices in hair styling, permanent waving, chemical straightening, haircutting, hair coloring and bleaching, scalp and hair treatments, facials, eyebrow arching and hair removal, makeup, manicuring and pedicuring. Students are required by the State Board of Cosmetology to complete COS 301 and COS 302 A - C for a total of 1,600 hours in order to qualify to take the licensure examination and become eligible to practice as a cosmetologist. (GR) (F, S)

#### DANCE

#### **DANCE 379B Dance Improvision**

3 units

Limitation on enrollment: Audition

Dance improvisation focuses on developing spontaneous artistic expression through movement in solos, duets, and group projects for performance and choreography. Guidance will be given to students to explore their inner artistic voices using body awareness, spatial design, and group contact. (GR)

### **EARLY CHILDHOOD STUDIES**

#### ECS 151 Infant and Toddler Development 3 units

Acceptable for credit: CSU

Advisory: ENGL 513

A study of infants and toddlers from pre-conception to age three including physical, cognitive, language, social, and emotional growth and development. Applies theoretical frameworks to interpret behavior and interactions between heredity and environment. Course emphasizes the role of family and relationships in development. This course covers effective strategies for personnel management and leadership in early care and education settings. Includes legal and ethical responsibilities, supervision techniques, professional development, and developing strategies for establishing collaboration and communication for a diverse and inclusive early care and education program.(GR/P/NP)

#### **ENGLISH**

## ENGL 179B Transfer Accelerated Reading and Writing Academic Skills 2 units

Prerequisite: Placement on START process at ENGL 513, ENGL 514, READ 310, or READ 110.

Corequisite: ENGL 101

This course is designed to support students with their academic reading and writing in an English 101 class. (GR/P/NP) (A)

## FILM

## FILM 108 Film and Television in the 21stCentury

3 units

Acceptable for credit: CSU, UC

This course deals with the social, institutional and cultural background of film and television in the United States and in a broader global context. Students will develop a critical understanding of film and TV content.. (F) (GR/P/NP)

#### FILM 109 Contemporary Asian Cinema 3 units

Acceptable for credit: CSU, UC

Advisory: ENGL 101

This course provides an introduction to the art and industry of Asian cinema. The course will explore the unique traditions of selected national cinemas from East, South and South-East Asia. Against the backdrop of globalization, we will explore the unique aesthetics of Asian film production. . (F) (GR/P/NP)

### LAW ENFORCEMENT

### **LE 427 Bicycle Patrol**

1.5 Units

Prerequisite: POST certified basic law enforcement academy or equivalent as determined by the Director, Law Enforcement Training. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee state regulatory licensing agencies will also grant equivalency.

Limitation on enrollment: Students must I) Be free of felony convictions; 2) possess a valid California Driver's License; 3) undergo a fingerprint and criminal history check; 4) be a minimum of I8 years of age; 5) be a United States high school graduate; pass the GED, pass the California High School Proficiency Examination, or have attained a two-year or four-year degree from an accredited college or university; and 6) complete a medical suitability examination.

Provides instruction on the skills necessary to properly use a bicycle for patrol, including bicycle maintenance, riding skills, apprehension techniques and tactical firearms. Curriculum includes basic riding skills, tactical firearms, equipment, nutrition, physical fitness and basic bicycle maintenance. (GR/P/NP)

#### LE 330 Core Custody Academy 11 Units

Limitation on enrollment: Students must score a 42 or higher on a POST Entry Level Law Enforcement Test Battery (PELLETB), and be approved by the Law Enforcement Training Director prior to beginning of class. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee that state regulatory or licensing agencies will also grant equivalency. Students will be required to complete a Medical History/Clearance form signed by their physician after medical examination, and a Personal History Statement and interview prior to start of class.

Students must 1) Be free of felony convictions; 2) possess a valid California Driver's License; 3) undergo a fingerprint and criminal history check; 4) be a minimum of 18 years of age; 5) be a high school graduate; pass the GED, pass the California High School Proficiency Examination, or have attained a two-year or four-year degree from an accredited college or university; and 6) complete a medical suitability examination.

Advisories: ENGL 306 and PE 141

The Core Custody Academy is designed to satisfy State of California Standards and Training for Corrections (STC) requirements for students wanting to be hired as a custody officer by a law enforcement agency or currently employed as such. The acronym "core" refers to the description of the job as it relates to the overall mission of the adult corrections officer job and its place in the criminal justice system and from the statewide job analysis research conducted periodically by the STC program of the California Board of State and Community Corrections. The CORE Academy is an intensive college course with para-military discipline. Students attending the academy will be academically and physically challenged, faced with solving complex problems in a stressful, disciplined and structured environment. Recruits receive basic training in many phases of custody of prisoners. (GR) (S).

## **MEDICAL ASSISTING**

#### MA 379A Success in MA Practice 1.5 units

The course prepares students for the challenges in Registered Medical Assistant (RMA) practice. It refreshes the fundamentals of practice and provides opportunities to perform the functions and procedures within the scope of entry level medical assistant. The course is designed for students who have completed a medical assisting program within five years and/or two years of recent work experience as a medical assistant. (P/NP) (A)

#### WELDING

### **WLDT 320 Pipe Advanced Welding**

3 units

Prerequisite: WLDT 107

Provides the advanced student with the theory and practical application of welding procedures and techniques in preparation for certification in the following areas: gas metal arc welding or shielded metal arc welding or gas tungsten arc welding. These meet the codes as provided by the American Welding Society, American Petroleum

Institute, American Society of Mechanical Engineers Standards. (A) (GR/P/NP)

### **THEATRE**

Limitation on enrollment: Completion of program application and procedures for enrollment.

Provides an opportunity to explore particular aspects of the performance disciplines which are not covered in detail in the existing program. Course includes public performances; therefore there is a limitation on enrollment based on audition/interview and/or portfolio review. Lab courses with offered units based on unit formula. (GR) (U)

THEA 198H Repertoire Of Beauty and the Beast and Newsies 3 units

1 unit

### **CHEMISTRY**

#### CHEM 140 Introductory Organic Chemistry 4 units

Acceptable for credit: CSU, UC

Prerequisite: CHEM 100 or CHEM 120

An introductory study of the compounds of carbon, including both aliphatic and aromatics. Laboratory work consists of synthesis and reactions of representative compounds. Consideration is given to the simple aspects of organic analysis and to a thorough introduction to reaction mechanisms. The course is generally required of pre-medical, pre-dental, and biology majors. Lecture: 3 hours weekly. Lab: 3 hours weekly. (S) (GR/P/NP)

#### BP 4900 TRANSFER OF CREDIT AND COURSE WAIVER

The district shall permit the waiver or substitution of courses required for completion of an associate in arts or associate in science degree or a program certificate, providing the district does not offer the required course on a regular basis and has a comparable course; or providing the student submits evidence that a course taken at another college is comparable to one required at Allan Hancock College.

Allan Hancock College cannot grant a course waiver or course substitution that is inconsistent with Title 5 regulations nor can it ensure that a substitution granted by the college will be accepted by another institution.

## **BP 4922 MINIMUM CLASS SIZE**

Minimum class size shall be fifteen (15) for all lectures, seminars, laboratory classes, and other instructional models. In cases where class size falls below the established minimum, the department head will confer with the Vice President, Academic Affairs to determine what action shall be taken. Independent study, research, coordinated instruction systems classes, and classes by arrangement are exempted from these guidelines. Police and Fire Academy tactical officers, program assistants, and program specialists are limited in the number of days they are eligible to work. The number of hours is limited by the budget for the program—one tactical officer may work a 40-hour workshop in 5 days, but another may work in a one-hour session on 40 different days. The number of hours is limited by the budget for the program—one aide may assist a 40-hour workshop in 5 days, but another may assist a one-hour session on 40 different days. The academy needs flexibility to schedule aides as they are available; for instance, if a fire aide is scheduled to assist a class on a certain day but is called to fight a fire that day, another aide is called to fill in. The total available budget for technical aides, divided by the hourly rate, is the maximum number of hours which can be worked by the entire group of technical aides.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Prior to February 1 each year, the governing board of a community college district is required to establish the nonresident tuition rate to be charged in the next academic year. State law prescribes the formula by which this rate is calculated. The calculation involves the prior year's "current expense of education" (CEE), full-time equivalent students (FTES) including apprenticeship hours and nonresident attendance, and the latest two years of the United States Consumer Price Index (USCPI).

The Allan Hancock College nonresident tuition rates for the last eight years are listed below.

Community colleges are not eligible for state apportionment funding for nonresident students. Nonresident tuition is intended to make up for this loss of revenue. Staff recommends increasing the rate for Allan Hancock College to \$234 per semester unit, based on statewide average cost per FTES for the 2015-16 base year.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

Nonresident tuition is projected to generate approximately \$550,000 for fiscal year 2017-2018. Based on projected nonresident enrollment and the recommended tuition rate, projected income may be higher than 2016-2017 income.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the board of trustees establish the Allan Hancock College 2017-2018 nonresident tuition rate at \$234 per unit, commencing with fall semester 2017.

Chapter 3 – General Institution

#### **BP 3600 AUXILIARY ORGANIZATIONS**

The Board of Trustees may recognize and approve auxiliary organizations established to provide the District supportive services, specialized programs and functions identified in Title 5.

The Superintendent/President shall establish the administrative procedures necessary to fully comply with California law relating to auxiliary organizations, and to submit this policy and those procedures to the Chancellor for the California Community Colleges as required by law. At a minimum, the procedures shall address the subjects required by Title 5.

Recognition and establishment of auxiliary organizations shall include a public hearing on the recommendation to recognize or establish an auxiliary organization; Board approval of the auxiliary organization; and approval of a written agreement between the District and the auxiliary organization describing the services, programs or functions to be performed. All such written agreements shall comply with the requirements of Title 5 Section 59257(j).

Any auxiliary organization recognized by the Board shall conduct its business in accordance with the administrative procedures approved by the Superintendent/President pursuant to this policy. Notwithstanding anything contained in the administrative procedures, any auxiliary organization recognized by the Board shall comply with Education Code provisions regarding:

- the composition of a board of directors and the way in which it conducts its meetings;
- conducting an annual audit;
- employing its work force;
- expending and appropriating its funds, and keeping its records.

No funds or resources, other than funds or resources derived from gifts or bequests, shall be transferred by the District to any of its auxiliary organizations for the purpose of either avoiding laws or regulations governing community college districts or providing the District with an unfair advantage with respect to any state funding mechanism. Such state funding mechanisms include, but are not limited to, general apportionment

funding, capital outlay funding, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services funding, and funding for programs and services for disabled students.

#### AP 3600 AUXILIARY ORGANIZATIONS

#### **Definitions**

**Board of Directors:** The term board of directors as used herein means the governing board of an auxiliary organization.

**Board of Trustees:** The term Board of Trustees as used herein means the Board of Trustees of the District.

**Board of Governors:** The term Board of Governors as used herein means the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

**CEO:** The term CEO (chief executive officer) as used herein means the Superintendent/President of the District or designee.

<u>District:</u> The term District as used herein means the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District.

Associated Student Body: The terms Associated Student Body, Associated Student Organization, Student Association, Student Organization, or ASB as used herein means an organization formed by any group of students from a college of the District in accordance with the provisions of Education Code Section 76060. All clubs and organizations recognized by an Associated Student Body or Organization shall be included in any auxiliary organization established by the Student Body or Organization.

#### Recognition and Establishment of Auxiliary Organizations

The Superintendent/President shall submit a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to establish an auxiliary organization when the organization will serve the District. The recommendation includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- The purpose(s) for which the auxiliary organization is to be established;
- Whether the proposed auxiliary organization will primarily serve the District or a particular District;
- The functions which the auxiliary organization is intended to perform:

- The proposed bylaws and articles of incorporation for the auxiliary organization, including the size and composition of the board of directors; and
- The proposed written agreement between the auxiliary organization and the District, as required in Title 5 Section 59259.

#### The process of recognition shall be as follows:

- When the Superintendent/President receives a request to establish an auxiliary organization, the Superintendent/President shall submit a recommendation concerning the establishment of said organization to the Board of Trustees within three months.
- The Board of Trustees shall hold a public hearing on each recommendation concerning the establishment of an auxiliary organization.
- At a subsequent scheduled meeting after the public hearing, the board shall announce its decision concerning the establishment of the organization, and, if approved, authorize the functions it may perform, identify the number and category or categories of the board of directors and approve contractual arrangements.

At such time as the District recognizes an auxiliary organization, it shall submit to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office any written agreements with the auxiliary organization, as well as the articles of incorporation, bylaws, or other governing instruments.

#### Recognized Services, Programs and Functions

Auxiliary organizations may be recognized and established by the Board of Trustees to perform services, programs and functions which are an integral part of the community college educational programs. The following supportive services and specified programs have been determined to be appropriate:

- Student association or organization activities;
- Bookstores;
- Food and campus services:
- Student union programs;
- Facilities and equipment, including parking;
- Loans, scholarships, grants-in-aid;
- Workshops, conferences, institutes and federal and specially funded projects;
- Alumni activities;
- Supplementary health services;
- Gifts, bequests, devises, endowments and trusts; and
- Public relations programs.

This section shall not be construed to prohibit an auxiliary organization from taking actions essential to satisfy the non-profit corporation or tax laws of the State of California or the Federal tax laws.

Operations of commercial services on a campus shall be self supporting when operated by an auxiliary organization.

#### **Authority and Responsibility of Auxiliary Organizations**

<u>Participation in workshops, conferences, or institutes offered by auxiliary organizations shall not be included in reports to the state for the purpose of receiving apportionment funding.</u>

All services, programs and activities that may be undertaken by an auxiliary organization shall be maintained for the general benefit of the educational program of the District. Upon Board of Trustees approval, an auxiliary organization may assume any of the services, programs and activities listed in these procedures in order:

- To provide the fiscal means and the management procedures that allow the District to carry on educationally related activities not normally funded by State apportionment;
- To eliminate the undue difficulty that would otherwise arise under the usual governmental budgetary, purchasing and other fiscal controls except as expressly prohibited by the Education Code or Title 5, or the District's procedures; or
- To provide fiscal procedures and management systems that allow effective coordination of the auxiliary activities with the District in accordance with sound business practices.

#### **Composition of Boards of Directors**

The board of directors of each auxiliary organization shall have the following composition:

Student Associations or Organizations: The board of directors shall consist primarily of students. The Associate Superintendent/Vice President, Finance and Administration may attend and participate in meetings of the board of directors in order to advise on policy and to provide for the control and regulation required by Education Code Section 76060.

Other Auxiliary Organizations: Any other District approved auxiliary organization that is established pursuant to Section 72670 et seq. of the Education Code shall have a board of directors appointed in accordance with the organization's articles of incorporation or bylaws and consisting of voting membership from one or more of the following categories: administration, staff; members of the community; students.

The size of the board of directors of an auxiliary organization shall be at least large enough to accommodate the one or more categories from which board members are selected.

The board of directors shall have the advice and counsel of at least one attorney admitted to practice in California and at least one certified public accountant. Upon being notified of the certified public accountant selected by an auxiliary organization, the district shall forward the applicable auditing and reporting procedures to the selected certified public accountant.

#### **Conduct of Boards of Directors**

No member of the board of directors of an auxiliary organization shall be financially interested in any contract or other transaction entered into by the board of which he/she is a member. Any contract or transaction entered into in violation of this section is void.

No contract or other transaction entered into by the board of directors of an auxiliary organization is void under the provisions of Education Code Section 72677; nor shall any member of such board be disqualified or deemed guilty of misconduct in office under such provisions, if pursuant to Education Code Section 72678 both of the following conditions are met:

- The fact of such financial interest is disclosed or known to the board of directors and noted in the minutes, and the board thereafter authorizes, approves, or ratifies the contract or transaction in good faith by a vote sufficient for the purpose without counting the vote or votes of such financially interested member or members.
- The contract or transaction is just and reasonable as to the auxiliary organization at the time it is authorized or approved.

The provisions of Education Code Section 72678 above shall not be applicable if any of the following conditions are met:

- The contract or transaction is between an auxiliary organization and a member of the board of directors of that auxiliary organization.
- The contract or transaction is between an auxiliary organization and a partnership or unincorporated association of which any member of the governing board of that auxiliary organization is a partner or in which he/she is the owner or holder, directly or indirectly, of a proprietorship interest.
- The contract or transaction is between an auxiliary organization and a corporation in which any member of the board of directors of that auxiliary organization is the owner or holder, directly or indirectly, of five percent or more of the outstanding common stock.
- A member of the board of directors of an auxiliary organization is interested in a
  contract or transaction within the meaning of Education Code Section 72677 and
  without first disclosing such interest to the governing board at a public meeting of
  the board, influences or attempts to influence another member or members of the
  board to enter into the contract or transaction.

It is unlawful for any person to utilize any information, not a matter of public record, which is received by the person by reason of his/her membership on the board of directors of an auxiliary organization, for personal pecuniary gain, regardless of whether he/she is or is not a member of the board at the time such gain is realized.

#### **Bylaws**

The bylaws of an auxiliary organization shall include, but not be limited to, specifying:

- The number of members of the board of directors, the categories from which members shall be selected and the method by which they shall be selected.
- The size of the board of directors.

- That at least one public business meeting will be held each quarter.
- The time table for the preparation and adoption of its program and annual budget and the submission of both for review to the Superintendent/President.
- That an attorney admitted to practice in this state and a licensed certified public accountant shall be selected to provide advice and counsel to the board of directors. Each shall have experience appropriate to the responsibility and shall have no financial interest in any contract or other transaction entered into by the board which he/she serves. Neither the attorney nor the certified public accountant needs to be a member of the board of directors.
- The procedures for approving expenditures.
- The procedures for accepting gifts, donations, bequests, trusts and specially funded grants and other income.

#### **Master Agreement between District and Auxiliary Organizations**

In the recognition and establishment of an auxiliary organization, there shall be a written agreement between the District and the auxiliary organization which sets forth the purposes of the auxiliary organization as permitted under this Regulation, and Title 5 Section 59259.

Should an auxiliary organization provide more than one service, program or function, such service, program or function may be authorized in one of more written contracts with the District. Such services, programs and functions thereby performed by an auxiliary organization may also be part of a joint powers agreement in accordance with Education Code Section 72671 and Government Code Sections 6500 et seq.

An auxiliary organization shall provide only those services, programs or functions authorized by a written agreement. No other service, program or function shall be permitted or performed unless a written agreement between the District and the auxiliary organization is amended to provide otherwise.

The agreement shall include, but is not limited to, the following provisions:

- <u>The services, programs, or functions the auxiliary organization is to manage,</u> operate or administer.
- A statement of the reasons for administration of the functions by the auxiliary organization instead of by the District under usual District procedures.
- The areas of authority and responsibility of the auxiliary organization and the District or College.
- The facilities and services to be made available by the District to permit the auxiliary organization to perform the services, programs or functions specified in the written agreement.
- The charge or rental to be paid to the District by the auxiliary organization for the facilities used or services provided in connection with the performance of its function. The charge or rental specified shall be identified in sufficient time before it is incurred so that the organization may determine to what extent it is liable.

- Full reimbursement to the District for services performed by the District or by District employees in support of the auxiliary organization. No more than 50% of the reimbursement may be made in the form of non-monetary benefits that the auxiliary organization provides to the District, such as increased community awareness or other such benefits that are agreed upon by authorized District officials and the auxiliary organization. The District shall assign a good-faith reimbursement value to such non-monetary benefits. Student body auxiliary organizations may be exempt from reimbursing all or any portion of the costs for such services. Methods of proration where services are performed by District employees for the organization shall be as mutually determined.
- A mutually agreed upon method of determining in advance to what extent the organization shall be liable for indirect costs relating to specially funded programs (including federally sponsored programs.).
- The responsibility for maintenance and payment of operating expenses.
- Proposed expenditures for public relations or other purposes which would serve to augment District appropriations for operation of the District. With respect to these expenditures, the auxiliary organization may expend funds in such amount and for such purposes as are approved by the board of directors of the auxiliary organization. The board of directors shall file with the Superintendent/President a statement of such policy on accumulation and use of public relations funds. The statement shall include the policy and procedure on solicitation of funds, source of funds, amounts, and purpose for which the funds will be used, allowable expenditures, and procedures of control.
- The disposition to be made of net earnings derived from the operation of the auxiliary organization, including earnings derived from facilities owned or leased by the auxiliary organization, and provisions for reserves.
- The disposition to be made of net assets and liabilities on dissolution of the auxiliary organization or cessation of the operations under the agreement.
- The covenant of the auxiliary organization to maintain its organization and to operate in accordance with Education Code Sections 72670-72682 and with Title 5 Sections 59250 et seq. as well as District Board Policy.
- The understanding that the auxiliary organization shall obtain the services and counsel of an attorney admitted to practice in the State of California whenever the need arises.
- The understanding that the auxiliary organization shall not enter into any contract or other business arrangement involving real property either by lease involving payments of more than \$25,000 per annum and duration terms of more than one year, or by purchase without prior notification and consultation with the Superintendent/President.

#### Personnel

Each auxiliary organization shall develop general regulations to govern its operations, including policies and regulations concerning the salaries, working conditions and benefits of its employees.

The aforesaid regulations shall not conflict with the implementing policies adopted by the Board of Trustees or with these procedures.

Except as otherwise provided in any board rules, the board of directors of each auxiliary organization shall, pursuant to Education Code Section 72672, provide salaries, working conditions and benefits for its full-time employees that are comparable to those provided District employees performing substantially similar services. For those full-time employees who perform services that are not substantially similar to the services performed by District employees, the salaries established shall be comparable to the salaries prevailing in other educational institutions in the area or commercial operations of like nature in the area.

Regular District employees may be employed by the auxiliary organization. District employees must resign or request a personal leave of absence from the District in order to accept employment with the auxiliary organization. District officers and employees who are required by the District's Conflict of Interest Code (AP 2712) to file disclosure of financial information are responsible to determine whether or not they are eligible to accept employment with the auxiliary organization immediately upon resignation from the District.

- Educational Administrators or other Management Employees may be granted a personal leave of absence for two semesters, which may be extended to a maximum of ten consecutive semesters
- Classified management employees may be granted a personal leave of absence for up to one year. This leave may not be extended beyond one year without the employee first having returned to active duty.
- Academic (faculty) employees may be granted personal leave of absence for two semesters. The leave may be extended for not more than six consecutive semesters.
- Classified employees may be granted a personal leave of absence for up to one year. This leave may not be extended beyond one year without the employee first having returned to active duty.

The board of directors of each auxiliary organization may provide retirement benefits different from those provided comparable District employees and may withhold retirement benefits or permanent status benefits or both from temporary employees. For the purposes of this procedure, a temporary employee is:

- An employee employed for a specific research project, workshop, institute or other special project funded by any grant, contract or gift; or
- An employee whose contract of employment is for a fixed term not exceeding three years.

The board of directors of each auxiliary organization may withhold permanent status benefits from executive employees. For the purposes of this procedure, an executive employee is any management employee with responsibility for the development and execution of the auxiliary organization's policies and includes, but is not limited to,

general managers, managers, directors and the like, as determined by the board of directors of each auxiliary organization.

Should retirement benefits be provided, they may but need not be provided by the Public Employees' Retirement System. Any newly created auxiliary organization is exempted from the requirement of providing retirement benefits for a period not to exceed three years from the date on which the Board of Trustees recognizes the establishment of such auxiliary organization.

An auxiliary organization may contract with the District for the services of a District employee and reimburse the District for that portion of the employee's full-time assignment (and corresponding benefits) that is spent in providing said services.

#### **Accounting and Reporting for Auxiliary Organizations**

The fiscal year of the auxiliary organization shall coincide with that of the District.

Each auxiliary organization shall develop an accounting system that is in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

The auxiliary organization shall implement financial practices that will assure its fiscal viability. Such standards shall include professional management, adequate working capital, adequate reserve funds for current operations, capital replacements, contingencies and adequate provisions for new business requirements.

Each auxiliary organization serving the District shall submit its programs and budgets for review at a time and in a manner specified by the Superintendent/President.

Funds derived from indirect cost payments shall only be appropriated with the specific approval of the Superintendent/President. All uses of such funds shall be regularly reported to the District's Board of Trustees.

Should the Superintendent/President determine that any program or appropriation planned by an auxiliary organization is not consistent with District policy, the program or appropriation shall not be implemented. Further, should a program or appropriation which has received approval, upon review, be determined by the Superintendent/President to be operating outside the acceptable policy of the Board of Governors or the District, then that program or appropriation shall be discontinued by direction of the Superintendent/President until further review is accomplished and an appropriate adjustment is made.

The board of directors of an auxiliary organization shall approve all expenditure authorizations.

If the auxiliary organization receives or accrues in any fiscal year gross revenue of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) or more, it shall also include in its bylaws an audit committee appointed by the board of directors. The audit committee may include

persons who are not members of the board of directors, but the member or members of the audit committee shall not include any members of the staff, including the president or chief executive officer and the treasurer or chief financial officer. If the auxiliary committee has a finance committee, it must be separate from the audit committee.

Members of the audit committee shall not receive any compensation from the corporation in excess of the compensation, if any, received by members of the board of directors for service on the board and shall not have a material financial interest in any entity doing business with the corporation. Subject to the supervision of the board of directors, the audit committee shall be responsible for recommending to the board of directors the retention and termination of the independent auditor and may negotiate the independent auditor's compensation, on behalf of the board of directors.

The audited financial statements shall be available for inspection by the Attorney General and shall be made available to members of the public.

The board of directors, or an authorized committee of the board, shall review and approve the compensation, including benefits, of the President or Chief Executive Officer and the Treasurer or Chief Financial Officer to assure that it is just and reasonable. This review and approval shall occur initially upon the hiring of the officer, whenever the term of employment, if any, of the officer is renewed or extended, and whenever the officer's compensation is modified. Separate review and approval shall not be required if a modification of compensation extends to substantially all employees.

#### Records and Annual Report of Auxiliary Organizations

Personnel and payroll records shall be maintained as permanent records by each auxiliary organization.

Adequate records of all other transactions of an auxiliary organization shall be maintained for a minimum of five years. Transactions of the organization include, but are not limited to, purchases, disbursements, and investments.

An annual report shall be submitted to the board of directors of the auxiliary organization and to the Superintendent/President by September 15. The report shall include, but is not limited to:

- All financial statements required to be filed with the State Chancellor's Office
- A comparison of budgeted and actual expenditures
- A description of major accomplishments of the organization
- A description of improvements proposed for operation of the organization.

Records maintained by an auxiliary organization shall be available to the public to inspect or copy at all times during the office hours of the auxiliary organization, pursuant to and with the exceptions provided in Education Code Sections 72690 et seq.

#### **Annual Audit**

Each auxiliary organization shall have an annual fiscal audit of any and all funds. The audit shall be performed by a certified public accountant in accordance with procedures prescribed by the State Chancellor. Copies of the annual audit report shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees and to the State Chancellor's Office within 30 days after it is received by the auxiliary organization. Thereafter, it shall be a public record, except as otherwise provided by law. Such audits may be conducted as part of a fiscal audit of the District itself.

Auxiliary organizations shall annually publish an audited statement of their financial condition, which shall be disseminated as widely as feasible and be available to any person on request. A reasonable fee may be charged to cover the costs of providing a copy. An auxiliary organization shall comply with this requirement by:

- Publishing the audited financial statement in a campus newspaper; or
- <u>Publishing a notice in a campus newspaper indicating the on-campus location</u> where copies of the financial statement may be obtained or reviewed; or
- <u>Publishing or noticing the audited statement in a campus bulletin or other appropriate medium if a campus newspaper is unavailable.</u>

#### <u>Insurance</u>

An auxiliary organization shall secure and maintain insurance adequate to protect its operations from catastrophic losses and as required by law, including but not limited to, the following:

- Comprehensive liability;
- Property and extended coverage, when applicable;
- All risks, money and securities;
- Fidelity and performance bonds covering its chief fiscal officer;
- Automotive liability when applicable; and
- Workers' Compensation

In any insurance policy secured by the auxiliary organization, the District shall be named as additional insured.

A copy of each policy or endorsement or insurance certificates setting forth the coverage and limits shall be provided to the District within 30 days from the receipt of the document.

In obtaining the insurance coverage, the auxiliary organization may secure the insurance directly through its own broker or through the District.

#### **Auxiliary Organizations: Use of Facilities**

Facilities may be made available by the District to an auxiliary organization to perform the functions specified in these regulations or in an agreement, under the following circumstances:

- The auxiliary organization may occupy, operate and use such District facilities as are mutually identified as appropriate for the functions and/or activities that have been undertaken by the auxiliary organization.
- The auxiliary organization shall pay to the District a charge or rental for the District facilities to be used by it in connection with the performance of its function or functions.
- The charge or rental to be paid by the auxiliary organization shall not require involved methods of computation, and shall be identified by the District and the auxiliary organization in sufficient time before it is incurred so that the auxiliary organization may determine to what extent it shall be liable.
- The charge or rental to be incurred by an auxiliary organization for use of District facilities in excess of five days shall be incorporated into the agreement between the parties.
- An auxiliary organization shall provide full reimbursement to the District for any services performed by District employees under the direction of the auxiliary organization. Methods of proration where services are performed by District employees for the auxiliary organization shall be simple and equitable.

#### **List of Auxiliary Organizations in Good Standing**

Each year, the Superintendent/President shall provide to the Board of Trustees a list of all auxiliary organizations in good standing. All auxiliary organizations which, after periodic review in the manner specified hereinafter in these regulations, are found to be in compliance with applicable laws, policies and regulations shall be included in the list.

When the Superintendent/President has reason to believe that a particular organization should be removed from the list of auxiliary organizations in good standing, a conference shall be held to determine whether such grounds for removal do in fact exist. The board of directors of such organization shall be entitled to participate in this conference, and shall have a minimum of one month notice to prepare response to the issues which have been raised.

Based upon such conference, the Superintendent/President shall decide whether the particular organization shall be removed from the list of auxiliary organizations in good standing.

An organization so removed shall not be permitted to do any of the following:

- Use the name of the District;
- Have as a director any official in the District acting in his/her official capacity;
- Operate a commercial service for the benefit of the District or any of its Colleges;
   and
- Receive gifts, property or funds to be used for the benefit of the District or any of its Colleges.

If the auxiliary organization is dissolved or ceases operations upon removal from the list of organizations in good standing, its net assets and liabilities shall be distributed according to the terms of the written agreement between the organization and the District.

#### <u>Limitation on Transfer of Funds to Auxiliary Organizations</u>

No funds or resources, other than funds or resources derived from gifts or bequests, shall be transferred by the District to any of its auxiliary organizations for the purpose of either avoiding laws or regulations which constrain community college districts or providing the District with an unfair advantage with respect to the application of any state funding mechanism. Such state funding mechanisms include, but are not limited to, general apportionment funding, capital outlay funding, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services funding, and funding for programs and services for disabled students.

#### **Compliance Review by Superintendent/President**

All auxiliary organization procedures and practices shall be reviewed to determine compliance with Education Code Sections 72670 et seq., and the policies, rules and regulations of the Board of Governors, and of the District. The Superintendent/ President shall designate the individual to conduct this review, which shall be conducted at the end of the first complete fiscal year after its establishment and at least once every three years thereafter.

When the Superintendent/President's designee determines, after inspection and review, that certain auxiliary organization procedures and practices are not in compliance with policies, rules and regulations of the Board of Governors and the District, a recommendation concerning the items of noncompliance shall be communicated in writing to the Superintendent/President and to the board of directors of the auxiliary organization. The board of directors shall reply in writing within one month, either describing the actions which will be taken, including time table, to bring said procedures and practices into compliance; or describing the reasons why the board considers the procedures already to be in compliance.

If the Superintendent/President's designee considers the proposed corrective actions to be acceptable, the auxiliary organization shall be so informed. A second compliance review shall be held at the end of the time agreed to and the results communicated in writing to the Superintendent/President and to the board of directors.

When the auxiliary organization fails to provide an acceptable proposal for corrective actions or fails to implement successful corrective actions within the agreed upon time, the Superintendent/President shall inform the board of directors of such further action as he/she considers appropriate, which may include a recommendation to the Board of Trustees for termination of the contract.

#### Revision of Rules and Procedures and Reports to the State Chancellor's Office

Rules and procedures for the administration of auxiliary organizations may be revised as necessary by the Superintendent/President or designee. The board of directors of each auxiliary organization in good standing shall be promptly notified in writing of such revisions and be informed of the date by which any changes in the organization's procedures must be accomplished.

Any such revisions shall be submitted to the State Chancellor's Office for approval.

The District shall report, as may be required from time to time, on the operation of its auxiliary organizations.

#### **BP 6320 INVESTMENTS**

The <u>S</u>superintendent/<u>P</u>president is responsible for ensuring that the funds of the <u>D</u>district that are invested are not required for the immediate needs of the <u>D</u>district. Investments shall be in accordance with law, including <del>California</del> Government Code Sections 53600 et seq.

The <u>S</u>superintendent/<u>P</u>president shall ensure that funds are invested in a manner which will provide the maximum security of principal invested, with secondary emphasis on achieving the highest yield while meeting the cash flow needs and conforming to all applicable state statutes governing the investment of public funds.

Investments shall be made based on the following criteria:

- The preservation of principal shall be of primary importance.
- The investment program must remain sufficiently flexible to permit the <u>D</u>district to meet all operating requirements.
- Transactions should be avoided that might impair public confidence.

#### **AP 6320 INVESTMENTS**

The <u>S</u>superintendent/<u>P</u>president is responsible for investing the funds of the <u>D</u>district that are not required for the immediate needs of the <u>D</u>district. Funds so invested shall follow the investment policy approved by the <u>governing B</u>board <u>of Trustees</u> in accordance with the Government Code Sections cited below and the following:

- Funds that are not required for the immediate needs of the <u>D</u>district shall be prudently invested in order to earn a return on such investment.
- The preservation of principal is of primary importance. Each transaction shall seek to ensure that capital losses are avoided, whether from securities or erosion of market value.
- The investment program remains sufficiently flexible to enable the <u>D</u>district to meet all operating requirements that may be reasonably anticipated in any fund. After preservation of principal, liquidity is the objective.
- In managing <u>D</u>district investments, <u>D</u>district officials avoid any transactions that might impair public confidence.
- Investments are made with precision and care, considering the probable safety of the capital as well as the probable income to be derived. (See Government Code Section 53600.6 regarding solvency and creditworthiness.)

District funds maintained by the county treasurer that are not required for the immediate needs of the district may be invested as follows:

- County Treasurer's Investment Pool. Investment of <u>D</u>district funds may be delegated to the county treasurer. In accordance with county procedures, <u>D</u>district funds may be pooled with other local agencies and invested by the County Treasurer in accordance with the investment guidelines specified by Government Code <u>Section</u> 53635 and investment policies adopted by the County Board of Supervisors.
- State's Local Agency Investment Fund (Government Code Sections 16429.1-16429.3). District funds not required for immediate needs of the <u>Delistrict</u> may be remitted to the State Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) for the purpose of

investment (Government Code <u>Section</u> 16429.1). District funds deposited with the LAIF are invested by the State Treasurer in securities prescribed by Government Code <u>Section</u> 16430, or the Surplus Money Investment Fund and as determined by the Local Investment Advisory Board (Government Code <u>Section</u> 16429.2).

 Other Investments. Other investments as permitted by Government Code Sections 53600 et seq., and in particular Government Code Sections 53601, 53601.8, and 53635,\* and 53635.8 may be made by the Superintendent/ Peresident subject to prior approval of the governing Beoard of Trustees.

\*Government Code Sections 53601, 53601.8, and 53635,\* and 53635.8 permit many very specific investments.

#### AP 6400 AUDITS

On or before April 1 of the fiscal year, the <u>B</u>board <u>of Trustees</u> shall approve the selection of an auditor who shall be a certified public accountant licensed by the California State Board of Accountancy.

An auditing firm's contract shall be for up to five years. The audit shall include all funds under the control or jurisdiction of the <u>D</u>district. The audit shall identify all expenditures by source of funds and shall contain:

- a statement that the audit was conducted pursuant to standards and procedures developed in accordance with Education Code Section 84040.5, and
- a summary of audit exceptions and management recommendations.

Audit reports for the preceding fiscal year must be presented to the board and submitted to the Setate Chancellor's Office by December 31 and presented to the Board of Trustees.

All newly hired academic employees shall have on file a medical certificate indicating freedom from communicable diseases, including tuberculosis. No academic employee shall commence service until such medical certificate has been provided to the District.

All newly hired employees must show that they have been examined within the past 60 days to determine that they are free from active tuberculosis.

All employees shall be required to undergo an examination within four years of employment and every four years thereafter, to determine if they are free from tuberculosis.

#### AP 7330 COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

#### For applicants for positions:

- A medical certificate is required showing that the applicant is free from any communicable disease, including, but not limited to, active tuberculosis, unfitting the applicant to instruct or associate with students.
- The medical certificate shall be submitted by a physician as authorized by code.
- The medical examination is conducted not more than six months before the submission of the certificate and is at the expense of the District.
- A contract of employment may be offered to an applicant subject to the submission of the required medical certificate.
- The medical certificate becomes a part of the personnel record of the employee and is open to the employee or his/her designee.

#### For employees:

- Notice of soon-to-be expired tuberculosis certificates are sent via USPS mail three, two, and one month prior to the expiration date.
- Employees who have not completed tuberculosis testing may also be notified by email and/or telephone of pending expiration.
- Employees who have not completed tuberculosis testing by the date of expiration are not permitted to work and are placed on unpaid status.

#### **BP 7335 HEALTH EXAMINATIONS**

The Superintendent/President shall establish administrative procedures related to medical examinations of candidates for appropriate positions prior to assuming the duties of the position. Such pre-employment medical examinations shall be required only after a conditional job offer has been made, and shall be required of any candidate for a position for which a pre-employment medical examination has been deemed appropriate. No candidate shall be required to participate in such an examination solely on the basis of the candidate's age or disability.

The procedures may require any employee to undergo a physical or mental examination where such a fitness for duty exam is job related and consistent with business necessity. Such medical examinations shall be at the District's expense and shall be conducted by a physician chosen by the District.

**Surveys** (*Goal SLS6: Engage students.*) (*Goal SLS8: Value student contributions.*) Staff in the office of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) are preparing a number of surveys to administer in the spring semester and beyond. In collaboration with ASBG, the IE staff will be administering a student survey focused on the availability, affordability, and quality of campus foodservice. The student leadership has expressed an interest in assessing the degree to which lack of evening food service is a concern to students as well as soliciting feedback from day students with regards to food cost, quality and healthy options. The IE staff will also develop and administer a survey to assess student support services for evening and online students in response to an accreditation recommendation to improve effectiveness.

**Student Success Scorecard** (*Goal IE1: To identify the institutional capacity to fulfill the college mission.*) (*Goal SLS2: To support student access, achievement, and success.*) In compliance with Education Code 84754.5, the staff in the office of Institutional Effectiveness has prepared an annual report for the Board regarding the Chancellor's Office Student Success Scorecard. As a condition of receiving specified funds in the annual Budget Act to encourage district-level accountability efforts, community college districts shall provide data, in a format and according to a schedule to be specified by the Office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges, for the purpose of the annual report to the Legislature specified in subdivision (b) and for purposes of providing the means for both internal and external assessment of the district's educational offerings in meeting the high-priority educational goals of the state.

For each district, and college as warranted, the report shall: (1) include performance data for the immediately preceding fiscal year, reflecting all measures specified in subdivision (c); (2) compare each district's and college's achievement with peer groups within the system as applicable to specific metrics; and (3) compare each district's and college's achievements with that of the system as a whole. The report shall further include a profile with summary background information on each district's or college's educational programs, missions, students, and service area demographics.
