Agenda No. 8 Program and Course Updates

Discussion: • Erin shared details about several new projects either under development or consideration within the AHC agriculture program:

• With the official Pest Control Adviser Preparation program now established, including 28 courses approved by the Department of Pesticide Regulation and two AHC Certificates of Achievement, Erin requested that the advisory committee members help promote this new pathway among their colleagues and employees. Erin also suggested that a formal internship program be developed to give students the opportunity to earn the industry work hours required for this alternate route PCA exam program. Committee members agreed that this program should be shared with the CAPCA board to further promote enrollment.

• This is the final year of the 3-year National Science Foundation Advanced Technological Education grant, which funded the significant expansion of the AHC agriculture program. However, Erin received a no-cost grant extension for an additional year to complete the project objectives.

• Erin informed the committee that she received approval of her proposal for supplemental funding from the NSF during the no-cost grant extension year in order to implement some projects that will improve the full utilization of the student farm for learning opportunities. This includes the development of 3 seasonal Agriculture Production Enterprise courses, which would give students the chance to earn credit while maintaining the fruit and vegetable crops in the on-campus student farm. This will also include installation of a wash station to improve produce safety sanitation practices.

• Erin is also working in collaboration with AHC's Industrial Technology program to develop a Mechanized Agriculture program with various pathways. She continues to work on the completion of the Precision Agriculture pathway as well. Erin informed the committee that AHC alumna and graduate of Cornell and UC Davis, Nelly Guerra, was recently hired to develop the new precision agriculture curriculum. Erin sought input from the committee regarding the best way to address the variety of mechanized/automated/technological needs of the industry. She shared some options for the proposed curriculum, which would start with an introductory-level certificate with courses that would introduce students to foundational knowledge and then students would choose from among more specialized pathways based on their interests – which could be from diesel/ag mechanics to computer/automated technology to precision agriculture. Erin explained that a subcommittee of advisory members and industry partners should be established to further hone the curriculum to meet industry needs. Dr. Greer has working experience with this sector of the industry and will provide relevant guidance.

• The NSF grant proposal for developing an Agriculture Biotechnology program was approved and funded. Dr. Anjali Misra shared the vision and proposed curriculum outline.

• Erin provided an update on the USDA produce safety grant that has been a collaboration with Cal Poly faculty. While the Produce Safety Alliance grower trainings provided through the grant funding have ended, there is still a need for the grant team to visit local, small farm operations to provide guidance and a mock audit on their produce safety plans. Erin requested feedback from





the committee on how best to incorporate food safety trainings and content into the AHC agriculture program curriculum.
