- Sunset Process: Faculty-driven Process
 - Successful offering refers to student completion of a course offering within the last two years. The current sunset report may not capture mini-sessions and summer course offerings.
 - Regarding courses that had successful offering but are listed in the sunset list, notify Rebecca Andres.
 - The department can provide a memo regarding the need for deferring sunset evaluation due to the impact of the pandemic within the last two years.
 - If the department decides to drop a course, there is no need to complete a form. Instead, proceed to COURSE DROP proposal type. Indicate rationale in the JUSTIFICATION field.
 - If the department decides to pursue strategies to promote successful offering, complete the FIRST APPEARANCE form and submit to the committee. The discipline faculty can update the course to make it relevant to students. When submitting the FIRST APPEARANCE form, the discipline faculty can put similar actions on several courses in one form.
- Discipline Placement and Minimum Qualifications
 - Modifying discipline placement. The college uses the CCCCO disciplines list. The list details the minimum qualifications for the specific discipline.

- The discipline faculty places a course in one or more disciplines to meet the intent and content of a
 - Single discipline placement.
 - Multi-disciplinary placement refers to course placement in multiple options of disciplines. The course can be taught by a faculty who meets the minimum qualifications in any of the disciplines.
 - Interdisciplinary placement refers to a course placement in two or more disciplines. The course can only be taught by a faculty who meets the minimum qualifications in both (all) the disciplines.
 - The AHC has the option to add more qualifications in any specific discipline.

CSU Ethnic Studies Competencies:

To be approved for this requirement, courses shall have the following course prefixes: African American, Asian American, Latina/o American or Native American Studies. Similar course prefixes (e.g., Pan-African Studies, American Indian Studies, Chicana/o Studies, Ethnic Studies) shall also meet this requirement. Courses without ethnic studies prefixes may meet this requirement if cross-listed with a course with an Ethnic Studies (ES) prefix. Courses that are approved to meet this requirement shall meet at least 3 of the 5 the following core competencies.

- 1. Analyze and articulate concepts such as race and racism, racialization, ethnicity, equity, ethno-centrism, eurocentrism, white supremacy, self-determination, liberation, decolonization, sovereignty, imperialism, settler colonialism, and anti-racism as analyzed in any one or more of the following: Native American Studies, African American Studies, Asian American Studies, and Latina and Latino American Studies.
- 2. Apply theory and knowledge produced by Native American, African American, Asian American, and/or Latina and Latino American communities to describe the critical events, histories, cultures, intellectual traditions, contributions, lived-experiences and social struggles of those groups with a particular emphasis on agency and group-affirmation.
- 3. Critically analyze the intersection of race and racism as they relate to class, gender, sexuality, religion, spirituality, national origin, immigration status, ability, tribal citizenship, sovereignty, language, and/or age in Native American, African American, Asian American, and/or Latina and Latino American communities.
- 4. Critically review how struggle, resistance, racial and social justice, solidarity, and liberation, as experienced and enacted by Native Americans, African Americans, Asian Americans and/or Latina and Latino Americans are relevant to current and structural issues such as communal, national, international, and transnational politics as, for example, in immigration, reparations, settler-colonialism, multiculturalism, language policies.

5. Describe and actively engage with anti-racist and anti-colonial issues and the practices and movements in Native American, African American, Asian American and/or Latina and Latino communities and a just and equitable society.

Discussion: The AP&P Committee has scheduled meetings on the next steps for MCGS and Ethnic Studies. The ad hoc discussions are open to everyone. It will open discussions and make recommendations to the AP&P committee by the end-of-the year.
