



Local, Affordable Access to Higher Education and Job Training

Allan Hancock College is a vital resource for our community. We train local nurses, healthcare workers, firefighters and first responders who keep us safe, and skilled workers who fuel our economy.

Each year, nearly **40 percent** of our local high school graduates rely on Hancock for higher education and job training, especially due to the high cost of attending the University of California and California State University systems.

Hancock has growing partnerships with Cal Poly SLO and Cal State Channel Islands to offer **four-year degrees** right here in our community, with plans to build a **University Center** that will expand access to bachelor's degrees for local students.



Aging Facilities Need Upgrades and Repairs

Our local community college is over 100 years old. A number of original buildings from the 1960s and '70s are still in use for classes and labs. Deteriorating electrical systems, plumbing, and roofs urgently need repair or replacement. Classrooms, labs, technology, and facilities need significant repairs or upgrades to keep pace with modern learning and safety needs.

Local Funding to Prepare Students for In-Demand Careers and Trades

The Allan Hancock College Board of Trustees has placed a \$290M bond measure on the November 2026 ballot to address facility needs and ensure local students and veterans have access to affordable, high-quality education and job training in safe, modern facilities.

If approved by voters, the bond measure would authorize \$290 million for critical repairs and upgrades, including:



Removing hazardous materials like asbestos and mold from older buildings



Upgrading classrooms, career-training facilities, and equipment so students are prepared for in-demand careers and skilled trades like nursing, welding, machining, and auto technology



Providing classrooms, facilities and technology needed to support high quality instruction in math, science, engineering and technology programs



Building a University Center to offer four-year bachelor's degrees locally in nursing and business in partnership with Cal Poly and Cal State Channel Islands — with additional programs in development



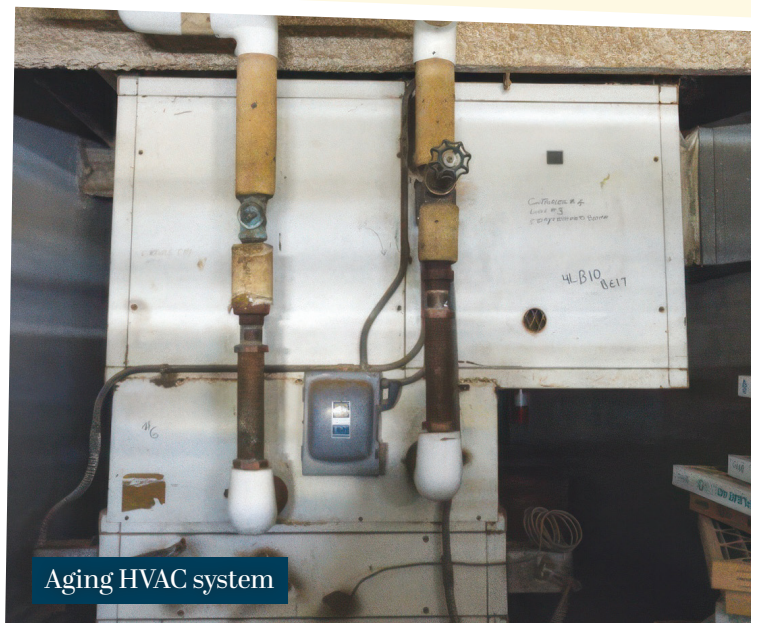
Repairing and replacing deteriorating roofs, plumbing, heating, ventilation, gas lines, sewer lines and electrical systems where needed

This bond measure would cost \$19 per \$100,000 of a property's assessed (not market) value annually, for so long as bonds are outstanding. The typical homeowner would pay ~\$70 annually.

Mandatory Fiscal Accountability and Local Control

The bond measure would require the following strict fiscal accountability protections:

- ◀ All funds would be controlled locally and stay in our community to improve local Hancock facilities; no bond funds could be taken away by the State or used for other purposes
- ◀ Independent citizens' oversight committee, annual audits, and public spending disclosures
- ◀ No money could be used for administrators' salaries or pensions



Passage of a bond measure would also qualify Allan Hancock College for \$38 million in state matching funds that would otherwise go to other community colleges.
