Mentoring Program: The TRIO-CAN program has launched a new mentor pilot program to work one on one with the Hancock's first-generation students, low-income students, and students with verifiable disabilities to help them achieve and experience academic and life success. Staff and faculty have been invited to join this <u>Serve Santa Maria</u> initiative and an informational dinner and launch was held at the Moxie Café on Thursday, August 13.

New Exhibit at the Ann Foxworthy Gallery: A unique new exhibit is currently on display at the Ann Foxworthy Gallery. CCCCO Task Force on Accreditation: Last week the Chancellor's Office released a report from the <u>Task Force on Accreditation</u> that recommends moving away from the ACCJC as the CCC accrediting body (page 8). As you can imagine, it has created quite a buzz – both positive and negative. In talking to a few other presidents around the state, the two primary issues surrounding the report are that few people even knew the task force was working and that the report is less a report on accreditation than it is a report on the ACCJC. I think both concerns are fair – a report on accreditation should also contain recommendations for colleges and recommendations for how colleges and the ACCJC can work together.

While these concerns are valid, I also think that the analysis of a good accrediting system found in the report (beginning on page 5) is something the ACCJC should take seriously. In particular, the ACCJC would better serve the institutions if our process focused on collegiality and improvement rather than compliance and punishment. The report has certainly gotten the attention of the ACCJC Commissioners – they have scheduled a special meeting on October 9 to discuss the report. A copy of the letter sent by Commission Chair Steve Kinsella and ACCJC President Barbara Beno is attached to the weekly email.

Campus Graphics Copier Lease Options: At the board meeting on Tuesday there was public comment regarding item 13D, a lease of copiers for campus graphics. We have attached to the weekly email the analysis performed by staff to determine the best value for the college. You will see that the objection raised by the speaker compared the cost of the copier bid only to the total cost of the lease (which includes per-copy charges). Comparing just copier bids reveals that the winning bidder actually offered the copier leases for \$413 per month less than the second place bidder. With all costs factored in, the winning bid is actually \$3,600 less per year. I am comfortable that the staff recommendation should be supported.

Bond Interest and Redemption Fund Budget: In answer to Trustee Lahr's question regarding the Bond Interest and Redemption Fund Budget, Michael Black sent the spreadsheet that is attached to this weekly email. AHC's estimate of repayment of principle and debt service on the bond is \$6,161,735 and AHC's estimate of property taxes that will be collected by the county treasury for repayment of principle and debt service on the bond is \$6,000,000

"Heroes Reborn": A show created by Hancock graduate Tim Kring premiered this week on NBC. "Heroes Reborn" is a reboot of Kring's Emmy nominated series "Heroes" that ran from 2006-2011. Kring took classes at Hancock College in the mid-70s and early 80s. His father, Ray Kring, was a long-time track and cross country coach at Hancock. You can catch "Heroes Reborn" on Thursday evenings at 8 p.m. on KSBY. It's a show that follows ordinary people who possess extraordinary powers.

Career Exploration Day: We are expecting a record number of high school students for this year's Career Exploration Day. More than 2,000 high school students from San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara counties have signed up for the event. It is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 9, from 9:30 a.m. to noon. So far, about 60 businesses and campus organizations have registered for booths. We are still accepting applications from businesses, so help spread the word. They just need to fill out a form at www.hancockcollege.edu/careerexploration as soon as possible. It is free for businesses to participate.

AHC Foundation Scholarship: The period to apply online for scholarships awarded by the AHC Foundation is now under way. The site went "live" on Monday and several students have already completed the online application. The deadline to apply is February 2, 2016. Last year, a record 363 students received \$537,000 in scholarships.

Short-Term October Classes: The on-campus push for short-term classes that start in mid-October is in full swing. ASBG students are helping spread the word by distributing brochures that include every available class. They are making announcements in classes and speaking to students on campus. The data shows nearly 80 percent of students who take mid-semester classes are existing students.

Artisan Market: The 1st Friday Artisan Market returns next Friday, October 2, from 4-7 p.m. in the parking lot between the Community Education building and the Humanities Complex. It'll be a "spooktacular" event with trick or treating for kids around 6 p.m., dozens of vendors, as well as a live band.

University Transfer Center (UTC) College Application Kickoff: On Thursday, October 1, between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., the UTC is hosting a transfer kickoff party to open the college application season and help students get on the right path to transferring to a four-year university. Former Hancock students who have transferred to four-year universities will be on hand to share their words of wisdom with current students.

Institutional Effectiveness Planning Retreat: The trustees are invited along with AHC faculty, staff, and students to participate in the annual Institutional Effectiveness Council planning retreat. The planning retreat is a key component in our council and committee structure that leads to prioritized institutional planning objections. The retreat will be held on Thursday, November 12 from 8:30 am – 4:30 pm and Friday, November 13 from 8:30 am – 2:00 pm at the Lompoc Valley Center.

Update on Copier Award: – We have reviewed the documents related to the copier award. As you know, Linda Shelby is a very talented and professional purchasing manager – it is very frustrating for a potential vendor make these types of assertions. The information provided to the board during the meeting does not match the bid document received from Ultrex. Now, after the fact, Ultrex is asking us to consider a new offer that would make them the low bidder (of course, they don't want us to go back to the other bidders and give them the same option!). Even if we did go back to the other vendors, this would essentially tell the business community that our bid opportunities aren't really the "final" opportunity. I am comfortable that we awarded the contract to the appropriate vendor.

- 2. Establishing opportunities for the Board to engage in meaningful discussions and reflection related to priorities and progress in achieving student success and equity; and,
- 3. Committing to ongoing professional development opportunities related to student success and equity.

Accreditation Update: I have shared with you the Chancellor's Office Report on Accreditation. This document is becoming something of a polarizing issue and some Districts are formally taking sides. So far, these districts are those that are intimately involved in the debate (trustees and chancellors who served on the report task force are seeking support while chancellors that work closely with the ACCJC are putting out resolutions challenging the report). My personal view is that AHC should not wade into this fight. I certainly have frustrations with some aspects of how accreditation works in California (and I have shared those with ACCJC), but the task force report was developed without input from all colleges and, as a result, I think it overstates the views of the system as a whole.

Our faculty and staff continued serving students this week, but we were all a little more quiet and thoughtful as we did it. Karisa held a special place in this college and everywhere I go, people are asking me to pass on good thoughts to Tim.

Scholarship for Karisa Bennett: In honor of Karisa, and at Tim's request, the college has established the Karisa Bennett Scholarship with the AHC Foundation. I remember Tim telling me early on how proud he was to hand her a diploma at graduation. Donations can be made online at www.ahcfoundation.org. Faculty, staff and administrators are collecting donations that will be matched up to \$5,000 from the President's Circle.

Staff and Student Town Hall Meeting: There will be a town hall meeting on Monday, Oct. 12 from 12-1:30 p.m. in G106A to talk address the recent tragedy at Umpqua Community College in Oregon. Participants are invited to learn what safeguards we have in place, share their concerns, and ask questions from our panel which consists of Alex Bell, coordinator of Student Health Services, Deborah Redding Stewart, personal counselor, Student Health Services, and John Staugaard, interim chief of police.

Career Exploration: Today we welcomed more than 1700 high school students to visit with more than 70 businesses and 50 programs. Today we moved the needle a little bit in our effort to change the odds for our community. It was a team effort from instructional faculty, counseling, student services staff, facilities and grounds, ASBG, student ambassadors, program staff, media services, campus safety, and administrators.

A few items of interest this week.

University Transfer Day: Hundreds of students, high school and collegeaged, attended our University Transfer Day and College Night events this week. Representatives from nearly 40 universities and colleges, including nearly every campus from the UC and CSU systems, were available to answer questions from students. The Public Affairs office organized a phone call blast that went to every registered student to let them know about Transfer Day. Several students who attended the event said it was due to the phone call.



Faculty Hiring: Attached at the end of this memo is the list of faculty positions that have been vetted through the shared governance process. The incremental cost matches the amount provided by the state last year. Even though we are over our faculty obligation number (FON), we need more instructional faculty to clear bottlenecks and rebuild programs that have not had full time faculty for some time. We anticipate a few more retirements in key areas as we move closer to the year-end, so the list may grow. We are hearing that as many as 2,000 faculty members may be hired statewide, so we intend to be aggressive in our recruiting.

Property Tax Projection: You may have seen the story in the Santa Maria Times about the tax revenue impact of shutting down the pipeline in Refugio following the oil spill (unfortunately, there is no web link). Mark Schniepp of the California Economic Forecast says the district stands to lose about \$1.2 million over four years. I have emailed him to ask for background information on how he calculated that number. Assuming it is accurate, that is not a large number to absorb as we move forward. However, if oil prices continue to remain low, we may see a reduction in taxable values on land with oil reserves. We will look into this more and give you an update soon.

Athletics Update: Saturday will be a very busy day for Hancock athletics. The football team hosts Ventura at 1 p.m. at Hancock Football Field in the team's final home game of the season. The Bulldogs need a win to keep their postseason chances alive. Then, at 7 p.m., the women's basketball team will take on West Hills Lemoore inside Joe White Memorial Gymnasium. The men's basketball team will play at a tournament hosted by Cuesta College this week. Their first home game is next Saturday, Nov. 14, against the junior varsity team of William Jessup University, at 3 p.m.

Annual Frightmare Forest: The Frightmare Forest was a success! The men's and women's Basketball teams we were able to raise money for their programs while having fun interacting with our community. Approximately 1,200 visitors walked through the forest. Staff hopes to make the Frightmare Forest an annual tradition for our campus and community.



Honor Society: Nearly 20 Hancock students representing the college's Alpha Gamma Sigma honor society took part in national Make a Difference Day. They provided a makeover at the Central Coast Aquarium in Avila Beach. It is a part of the club's commitment to community service projects.

Food for our Students: Dozens of our students received a bag full of free fruit, vegetables and other food items thanks to the help of ASBG, our student ambassadors, Carmen Camacho, Stephanie Robb, and other volunteers. They helped to distribute food to our students that was donated by the local Food Bank. Each student who walked away with a bag left with smile on their face and was grateful for the donation.

Thank you for the thorough conversation with the deans and department chairs regarding faculty prioritization. Based on our conversation, I asked Shelly Allen to calculate the incremental cost for hiring new faculty members based on the proposal. The result of that analysis is here:

In addition, we will be transitioning the astronomy position added last year to general fund, adding another \$91,000. If all of these positions are added in 2016-2017, we will see an increase in costs of approximately \$515,000 for new faculty positions.

As we discussed during the prioritization meeting, the Board of Trustees is supportive of the need to add instructional faculty and understands that there will be a cost associated with it. I am comfortable taking this proposal to the Board, but we need to remind the campus that the additional \$515,000 is on top of the increased costs for next year (e.g., salary schedule movement, longevity, PERS/STRS). At this point, FY 2016-2017 budget projection shows a deficit of \$1.4 million, so we will be pushing that estimate to approximately \$2 million. As we move into spring and see the Governor's budget, we will need to monitor and assess the steps that will need to be taken to get us balanced.

My plan is to work with the Academic Senate to set a priority order for advertising these positions, beginning with announcements and advertisements at the end of the fall semester or immediately at the start of the spring semester.

Foster Youth Grant: Hancock was one of 10 community college districts in the entire state to be awarded a grant to assist foster youth succeed in college. The college will receive \$1.2 million to ramp up its CARE-For-You program over the next three years. Studies show 43 percent of foster youth who compete high school enroll in college and of those, only 40 percent continue to the second year. Currently, there are about 200 current and former foster youth enrolled at Hancock. The grant will allow us to provide more comprehensive services on and off campus.

AHC was selected for this in large part because of our prior work to prepare for the grant. Last year we allocated \$15,000 from the President's Circle to support an effort led by Will Bruce to build a community support system for local foster youth. Our advisory committee is making a difference and was a key factor in receiving the grant.

CARE Turkey Feast: Thanks to the generosity of our staff and community members, 75 single-parent families received a turkey and all the trimmings on Tuesday. EOPS/CARE held its seventh annual CARE Turkey Feast. Trustee Lahr and I helped distribute the food to students on campus. Nearly \$3,500 in donations from faculty and staff contributed to making sure our students feel valued and nurtured this holiday. We also received great media coverage from all the television stations, The Santa Maria Times, and Noozhawk.

A few items of interest this week.

Orfalea Foundation Grant: On Friday the college announced we received a \$785,000 grant from the Orfalea Foundation to benefit the early childhood studies program and Children's Center Lab School. The money will go toward hiring an ECS teacher, updating the curriculum, adding some features like a serenity garden and a mud center to our outdoor classroom. Orfalea also donated \$150,000 in 2013 to help us complete our outdoor classroom and water wall. The gift includes a request to rename the Children's Center Lab School as the Orfalea Children's Center Lab School at Allan Hancock College. With Board approval, a renaming ceremony will take place on campus in the spring.



ASBG End of Semester Dinner: We celebrated the last day of class with ASBG on Wednesday. Approximately 30 students came over to our house for a Santa Maria BBQ. We are fortunate to have such committed student leadership – and they are fortunate to have support from Stephanie Robb, Henry Schroff and Dr. Henry Davis.

UC Application Deadline Extension: A campus-wide push took place to let students know the University of California extended its transfer application deadline until January 4. Students were notified via emails, messages were posted all over social media, and flyers were posted around campus. Just in case you were wondering, last year nearly 150 students applied to schools in the UC system and about 70 percent were admitted.

PTK Scholarship Application: The Phi Theta Kappa honor society supports the Academic All American program, the most prestigious scholarship competition for community college students. Last year AHC had its first entrant named to the All California team. This year I will be able to submit two nominees for the award thanks to the amazing efforts of Kathy Headtke and Mary Alice Majoue. They are also recruiting students to apply for the Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship, which offers support based on financial need. We will keep you updated on the progress of the nominations.

Football Recruiting: It's early in the college football recruiting period, but our big kick returner and running back Malik Williams is already getting some attention from four-year universities. He has received three scholarship offers already, including one from Purdue University which plays in the powerful Big Ten Conference. Malik and six other football players also received All-Conference recognition this week.



Child Abuse Reporting Training: The Central Coast Cal-SOAP Project is hosting a training for AHC college employees/tutors/peer advisors on child abuse reporting laws. Faculty and staff have been encouraged to send their student employees to this two-hour training on January 14, 2016 at the Student Center G 106 A&B (10 a.m.). A few items of interest this week.

Food for Students: Arrangements have been made to provide food from the county food bank to our low-income students. The cost to provide items such as peanut butter, bread, Pop Tarts, granola bars, Top Ramen noodles, canned tuna, and other non-perishable items is nominal. Funds from the President's Circle have been set aside to pay for items that students who do not cook, do not have access to a kitchen, or are homeless, can eat. Produce such as apples, pears, oranges, avocados, broccoli, potatoes, etc. are free. This is a team effort as our office orders and pays for the food, our maintenance staff picks it up, and ASBG students assist Stephanie Robb in distributing it. Sign-in sheets indicate 256 students received free food on November 5 and 19. The sheets also tell us we have lots of single parents, two homeless students, and 52 households with six to ten people. We plan to help feed students on the first and third Thursday of the month and will resume this assistance when students return for the spring semester.

CSEA/District 2015/16 Contract Reopeners - Come to a Close: The District and CSEA have agreed to withdraw their 2015-16 Contract Reopeners thus mutually agreeing to bring the 2015-16 negotiations process to a close.

Santa Barbara Scholarship Foundation On Campus: The student services office has collaborated with the SB Scholarship Foundation to have a staff member present on our campus on a weekly basis. The Foundation's Jose Olivera will be on the Santa Maria Campus on Tuesdays and the Lompoc Valley Campus on Wednesdays.

New Commercial: The Public Affairs office just wrote and produced a new 30 second television commercial to promote the college and spring registration. It'll run throughout cable television over the next six weeks, as well as on Univision and on online/mobile sites like YouTube. Last year's commercial called "I Chose" was voted as the top community college television commercial in the state and third best among colleges on the west coast. Here is a link to the new commercial.

Classified Professional Development: At Tuesday night's Board meeting, Jessica Parker reported that HR – primarily Coordinator of HR and Professional Development Sharan Kelly with support from HR Assistant Terilyn Hall -- has been working with CSEA to develop a process for classified professional development. This process included input from the Professional Development Committee, which is where the effort began. I am happy to report that the process is now complete. HR posted the classified professional development process documents for employee use today.

Student Health Survey: Every three years Student Health Services in consortium with Health Services Association California Community Colleges conducts a campus wide survey using the American College Association National College Health Assessment. This spring semester, between February 22 and March 16, the survey will be conducted online for the first time. Here are some facts gathered from the last survey:

- Students reported that the top three factors that had resulted in a negative impact on their academics are **stress** (23.4%), **work** (18.6%) and **sleep difficulties** (16.1%)?
- Did you know that students reported being in a **physical fight** (12.8%), **experienced a verbal threat** (21.4%), and **experienced an emotionally abusive intimate relationship** (14.1%)?
- Did you know that **4.2**% of our students experienced an **unintentional pregnancy** in the last 12 months?
- Did you know that 52% of our students reported not having any alcohol in the past 30 days?

Classified Professional Development: At Tuesday night's Board meeting, Jessica Parker reported that HR – primarily Coordinator of HR and Professional Development Sharan Kelly with support from HR Assistant Terilyn Hall -- has been working with CSEA to develop a process for classified professional development. This process included input from the Professional Development Committee, which is where the effort began. I am happy to report that the process is now complete. HR posted the classified professional development process documents for employee use today.

Campus Bookstore Holiday Hours: The Santa Maria bookstore will be closed from Dec 22- Jan 3 and open December 21 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The Lompoc bookstore will be closed Dec 21 through January 3.

CSEA/District 2015/16 Contract Reopeners - Come to a Close: The District and CSEA have agreed to withdraw their 2015-16 Contract Reopeners thus mutually agreeing to bring the 2015-16 negotiations process to a close.

Sanctions for Accreditation Organization: The US Department of Education's accreditation unit has recommended that the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges should lose some of its existing authority and not be allowed to expand its jurisdiction. See more about this in the linked article on Inside Higher Ed.

Benefits Reporting: The Affordable Care Act (ACA) requires a large amount of employee tracking, data gathering, and reporting from the District. For 2015, if the District was not at least 70% compliant in offering benefits to employees who work 30 hours of more per week on average annually, we would owe what is called a "Play or Pay" penalty. Over the last several weeks we were worried about a substantial penalty – perhaps as much as \$1.8 million – from an inability to track hours for employees (a combination of new county payment processing and lack of key staff). Benefits Technician Pam Blanchard – with the help of Holly Barrett – gathered all of the necessary data within a few weeks, keeping AHC in compliance for 2015.

Transfer Center News: Attached is the most recent report (CCTCC report CalPoly.pdf) from Cal Poly, SLO for fall 2015 admissions. Per usual, AHC has the highest transfer acceptance rate. The transfer center is in the process of planning an "admitted transfer students" day for Friday, April 1 and preparing for a Cal Poly open house April 14-16 for local AHC and Cuesta students who have been accepted to Cal Poly, SLO.

ACCJC in the News: The struggle with the ACCJC continues. The attached article (*Why California is trying to Ditch Its Community-College Accreditor.pdf*) from the Chronicle of Higher Education reports that Brice Harris will be testifying before the National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity in regards to the ACCJC.

CCCT Board Elections: The CCCT board election process has begun. The nomination period is January 1 through February 16, 2016. Attached is a file (CCCT Election Materials.zip) that contains a PDF of the nomination packet, as well as fillable word documents of the candidate forms.

Football Recruiting: Football's Malik Williams has now received seven offers from four-year universities. He led the state this season for most all-purpose yards per game and was an All-Conference First Team pick. So far, he's received offers from University of Alabama Birmingham, Texas State (BeeJay – weigh in for your boys!), Purdue, Valdosta State, Southeastern Louisiana and West Georgia.

Women's Basketball: The women's basketball team is off to a 9-2 start, its best start in nearly 20 years. The Bulldogs are ranked No. 13 in the South Region Poll for the program's first regional ranking in at least 15 years. The team is comprised almost entirely of local athletes and ranks second in the state for best defense. The women's next home game is Jan. 6 in their conference opener against Santa Barbara.



Hancock Alumus on National Television: You will see former Hancock All-American Cameron Artis-Payne on national television playing for the undefeated Carolina Panthers. The rookie will be the back-up running back and has 12 carries for 31 yards so far this season. The Panthers play the New York Giants this Sunday. Kickoff is at 10 a.m. PST on FOX.

Happy new year! We are back on campus and excited for the new year!

Governor's Budget Released: The outlook for the coming year budget is positive – albeit not at the record setting levels we saw last year. The budget assumes a 0.47 percent COLA, two percent enrollment growth and additional funding for CTE Pathways. Even with the good budget news, the Chancellor's office offers the following warning (emphasis added):

While the 2016-17 fiscal year appears to be a strong one for the California Community Colleges, we need to remember that districts will face substantial challenges in the coming years due to increases in the STRS and PERS employer contribution rates. Further, these increases will need to be addressed by colleges at the same time that Proposition 30 revenues phase out (the sales tax provision expires on December 31 of this year and the income tax provision expires at the end of 2018).

Analysis and information from the Chancellor's Office is included as an attachment to the weekly email along with an email from Larry Galizio at CCLC with their analysis.

New year, new laws. Answers to questions asked about our response to new laws going into effect this month:

- 1. We are required to provide a place for breastfeeding students/parents. How do we do this?
 - a. We allocate private space for breastfeeding employees and try, when possible, to provide that space near the employees work area. Most recently, we allocated a private/shielded/lockable breakroom with a couch and chairs in Bldg. A-2 and provided a sign for them to put on the door. Felix is on vacation this week and will provide an update on efforts to find a space for students soon.
- 2. Related to this, it appears that the Marian Theater offers no changing tables in the restrooms.
 - a. Felix is on vacation this week. We will look into the possibility and respond soon.
- 3. The minimum wage increases to \$10/hr.
 - a. The Board approved the changes to the classified exempt salary schedule (SS80) in November and to the student salary schedule in October to account for the \$10.00 minimum wage. Those are the only two salary schedules that include minimum wage.
- 4. Homeless students cannot be charged for proficiency or entrance exams.
 - a. Yes, that is correct we do not charge homeless students for these services.

- 5. Legislation struck the use of the word "Alien" from the California Labor Code and that they require history textbooks to include the deportation of Mexicans.
 - a. We are aware of the new legislation and will ensure compliance as we move forward with adoption of new textbooks.
- 6. California community colleges can suspend or expel students accused of sexual assault off campus.
 - We revised our policies last year and are currently working with HR to establish
 procedures related to these violations. Click here for a copy of our Standards of

ACCJC Loses Appeal: The decision that California's community college accreditor was not meeting federal accreditation standards was upheld by the Education Department and the ACCJC has a year to resolve their issues. Read more in the <u>Inside Higher Ed article.</u>

Day in the Life of a First Responder: Saturday, January 9 the Public Safety Training Complex will be hosting the "Day in the Life of a First Responder" auction item from the Joe White Memorial Dinner and Auction.

Record-breaking Recruitment: Human Resources is currently on a record-breaking pace for recruitment job postings for fiscal year 2015-2016. Today, Liz Phillips posted her 58th recruitment. To put that in context, HR posted 65 recruitments total for fiscal year 2014-2015, and that was our second busiest year to date. In order to encourage diverse and robust applicant pools for faculty positions, HR staff (Liz, Terilyn Hall, and Stefanie Aye) will be attending recruitment fairs in San Francisco and Los Angeles the last two weekends of the month. Hancock a Top College: We received some exciting news Friday. The college has once again been selected as one of the top 150 colleges in the nation by the Aspen Institute! We have been invited to apply for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's highest recognition. Our application is due March 4, 2016. More details about how many other California colleges are in the top 2015 will be released next week by the Aspen Institute. The invitation email is attached to the weekly email.

Campus Safety Workshop: In light of the recent national headlines, the college will host a campus safety workshop open to all faculty and staff on Thursday, Jan. 21 from 9 a.m. to noon in the C-40 Forum. Felix Hernandez, John Staugaard, Deb Annibali, Rex Van Den Berg, Alex Bell, Roger Hall, and Mike Perkins, a SWAT commander and a Santa Barbara County Sheriff's lieutenant, will give presentations. It'll be the first in a series of campus safety training workshops scheduled for the spring term.

Student Lighting Concern: A student expressed concern during the most recent Trustee Open Hour. The concern was due to the lack of lighting on the Santa Maria Campus' ADA access ramps. Rex Van Den Berg, director of plant services, and his staff will work on providing lighting in this area.

I was one of three district CEOs, along with a half dozen college presidents from LACCD, representatives of the Department of Education and the leadership team from Fielding.

"Seizing the Moment" Report: The American Association of Community Colleges (AACC), the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) and Higher Ed for Higher Standards released <u>Seizing</u> the Moment: Community Colleges Collaborating with K-12 to Improve Student Success. The report calls on community college presidents and trustees to embrace the higher standards many K-12 school systems have adopted and implement strategies to increase college readiness and success. The report recommends that community college presidents and trustees:

- 1. Partner with K-12 to bring more substantial college readiness supports and interventions into high schools;
- 2. Identify college-readiness measures that can be used in high school to trigger these supports and acceleration strategies for students;
- 3. Revise institutional placement practices to honor college-ready achievements;
- 4. Provide first-year students who are not yet college ready with co-requisite and other evidence-based remediation opportunities and guided pathways; and
- 5. Work with system leaders and policymakers to adopt statewide policies that encourage these practices.

Only 30 students in the state received the recognition out of the more than 2.4 million enrolled in California's 113 community colleges. Congratulations to Jeremiah Hernandez and Rie Waldon, who have both overcome huge obstacles to succeed. Jeremiah had been dismissed from Hancock multiple times before he got his life on track. Get Focused Stay Focused Approved: AP&P finalized the approval for GFSF this week, allowing the program to come to the Board in March. This program will help high school freshmen develop a personalized ten-year plan for their education and career. President's Roundtable: About 25 principals and superintendents from our district, as well as southern San Luis Obispo County attended the annual President's Roundtable Thursday morning. We updated them on concurrent enrollment, Get Focused...Stay Focused!, and other topics. We received some valuable feedback and suggestions. They expressed gratitude for the college's increased outreach and communication.

LEED Certification: Three of our Measure I projects have received LEED certification! The Student Services Center and Early Childhood Studies Child Care Center received Gold certifications. The Public Safety Training Complex earned Silver certification. They are our first LEED-certified buildings. LEED, which stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, is the national benchmark for the design, construction, and operation of green buildings.

A few items of interest this week.

Student Success Summit: G-106 was full today with faculty, staff, administrators and representatives of partner organizations. The group gathered to learn about accelerated programs designed to help students complete basic skills sequences in a timely manner. Katie Hern from Chabot College presented the latest research on improving outcomes for students who start below college level. We know that time is the enemy for our students – and our faculty are making significant changes to help students complete their programs more



quickly so they can get on to work or to their transfer university. A highlight of the day was the student panel comprised of "acceleration graduates." Each will be transferring and credited the time saved in acceleration as a key factor in their success.

A few items of interest this week.

Community Pride: Be sure to check out the Santa Maria Times next Friday, April 29. Hancock will be featured in an eight-page spread that will include student profiles, a story on how completing CTE classes results in increased wages, as well as information about Community Education, summer/fall registration, online classes and financial aid.

Nursing Grant: The certified nursing assistant (CNA) program received a \$55,000 grant from the Arthur N. Rupe Foundation. The money will fund scholarships for all 45 of our students next year to pay for fees, books, State Board exams, uniforms, and blood pressure cuffs. It'll also help pay for part-time instructors, and a new mobile patient lift. The foundation has awarded more than \$120,000 to the program over the last five years

Design Village Competition: Two teams of Hancock architecture students participated in Cal Poly's annual Design Village competition April 16-18. The theme was "Aura" and the teams created a spirit tree structure that included four stabilized hammocks. Students spent two nights in the structures they designed and constructed as part of the event.





California Mini Corps: California Mini Corps, a program that utilizes students as role models to raise the aspirations of migrant students is up and running at Hancock, their <u>website is located here</u>. Commencement Banner Carriers: The college asked Jeremiah Hernandez and Rie Waldon to carry the banners into the 2016 Commencement. Both students were All-California Academic First Team selections, and prove we are changing the odds. Hernandez was dismissed multiple times from Hancock for academic reasons before he turned his life around. He raised his GPA from a 0.40 to 3.78. He will transfer to Cal Poly in the fall. Waldon did not know English when she moved from Japan to Lompoc in 2012. She started at Hancock with a non-credit ESL class, and four years later she has a 4.0 GPA and is transferring to UCSB.

UCSB Economic Forum: This morning I presented on the topic of *California's Higher Education Desert*. The slides are attached to the weekly email. For context, the theme is as follows:

- 1. There are economic issues facing north county;
- 2. The CSU and UC systems do not have capacity to meet demand for highly skilled workers (because of state funding cuts);
- 3. The problem of access is especially acute in north county;
- 4. We have three options to address the issue, but all need state support: university center, CSU satellite campus, or expansion of the community college baccalaureate.

The presentation was well received and I think we might get a little traction in our efforts to improve access for north county.

Fifteen and Counting: The streak continues. Cal Poly's Region 6 Fall Community College data shows 48 percent of Hancock students who applied to transfer for fall 2016 were accepted. Our transfer acceptance rate is the highest in the state for the 15th straight year, and nearly triple the state average of 16.7 percent. Cuesta's transfer acceptance rate was 39 percent and Santa Barbara's was 20 percent. The streak is further evidence the college is changing the odds for students in our community. It's also a testament to our counseling and instructional staff.

Retirements and Recognition Reception: The College celebrated 15 retirees Thursday afternoon and Human Resources was awarded department of the year. Photos from the event can be found <u>at this link</u>.

Inter-city Roadway Grid: Work has been completed on a simulated city roadway grid located inside the existing high speed track at Hancock's public safety training complex (PSTC) to benefit students training in police and emergency vehicles. See photos.

PCPA Foundation and Auxiliary Corp.: A report attached to this email entitled "Developing a Common Understanding of the Roles and Responsibilities of the PCPA Foundation and the PCPA Auxiliary Corporation" discusses ways in which the two organizations might integrate their fundraising efforts in order to broaden and coordinate resource development activities in the future. The report is a result of a discussion that took place on Thursday, April 21, 2016 on campus.

Food Share Because We Care Update: The bi-monthly food giveaway, known as Food Share Because We Care, wrapped up this month. Since it started in February, the college delivered 25,633 pounds of food to nearly 1,500 students. The college teamed up with the Santa Barbara County Food Bank to deliver fresh produce and other items to students on the first and third Thursdays of the month. A big thanks to

Carmen Camacho, Stephanie Robb, Henry Schroff, Christine Bisson, the student ambassadors, and dozens of other volunteers for making it happen. The program was funded by the Allan Hancock College Foundation.

Hancock to Host SB County Food Action Plan Event: The college will host the unveiling of the Santa Barbara County Food Action Plan on Tuesday, May 24, at 9:30 a.m. on the patio outside the Student Center. The plan is a strategy-based community blueprint for an accessible, thriving, sustainable and healthy food system. It accounts for the entire food system – production, processing, distribution, access and waste management. Superintendent/President Kevin G. Walthers is a member of the Advisory Board that is co-chaired by county supervisors Salud Carbajal and Steve Lavagnino.

Making a Splash: Three Allan Hancock College swimmers, all freshmen, represented Hancock at the State Championships last weekend. Alexandria Kwong finished fourth in the state in the women's 100-yard butterfly, ninth in the 200-yard backstroke and 11th in the 200-yard butterfly. The Orcutt Academy graduate won conference titles in all three events last month. Madalena Diaz came in seventh in the state in the 1,650-yard freestyle, 13th



in the 500-yard free, and 14th in the 400-yard individual medley. Rebecca Gonzalez finished 22nd in the 200-yard breaststroke and 17th in the 100-yard breaststroke. Diaz and Kwong broke school records in each of their events. Together they led the Bulldogs to their highest finish in program history, which was 18th out of 42 teams.

Record-Breaking Year: The 47th annual Allan Hancock College Foundation Scholarship Banquet promises to be another epic event. The foundation will award 456 scholarships to 375 students for a total of more than \$546,000. All three figures are new AHC Foundation records. There will be 24 new scholarships awarded this year. Among the guest speakers will be Jesus Sanchez, who received the Marian Hancock Scholarship in 2014, and Yesenia DeCasaus, who established a new scholarship this year to honor her son Nicolas, a former film student who passed away from cancer in 2014. The banquet is Thursday, May 26, at 6 p.m. inside the Joe White Memorial Gymnasium.



MLB Drafts Former Student: Former Hancock pitcher Nathan Thompson was drafted by the Houston Astros during the 2016 MLB Draft last week. The left-handed pitcher was selected in the 27th round after an outstanding senior season at Oklahoma Baptist University. The Santa Ynez High School alumnus still ranks in the Top 10 in Hancock history for most career innings pitcher and strikeouts. He is the first Bulldog taken in the MLB Draft since 2013.
