

APOSTROPHES

Apostrophes Apostrophes are used to show omission or possession.

PART I: SHOWING OMISSION

Use an apostrophe to show that one or more letters is missing in a contraction.

Examples:

I + am = I'mthere + is + there's are + not = aren't

she + is = she'swhat + is + what'scan + not = can't

did + not = didn'twould + not = wouldn'tyou + are = you're

we + are = we'reyou + have =you've is + not = isn't

PART II: SHOWING POSSESSION

Use an apostrophe + s ('s) to show possession when a noun does not end in the letter s.

Examples:

the house of the family = the family's house

the sister of Patricia = Patricia's sister

PART III: SHOWING POSSESSION WHEN WORDS END WITH S

Use just an apostrophe (') to show possession in a noun that ends in the letter s (or ends in an s or z sound).

Examples:

the rooms of the girls = the girls' rooms

the books of the students = the students' books

the children of Luz = Luz' children

REMEMBER! DO NOT USE AN APOSTROPHE WITH POSSESSIVE PRONOUNS!

They already show ownership. Some examples of possessive pronouns are: his, hers, its, yours, ours, and theirs.
