TO	TOO	TWO
<i>To</i> with one o means something like toward or at. It is also used before a verb to make an infinitive. (In an infinitive, the idea of the verb rather than the action of the verb may be the main point: Tomas expects <i>to</i> be home at midnight.)	<i>Too</i> with two o 's means "also," or "more than enough."	<i>Two</i> is the number 2.
These three words are all pronounced exactly alike. They rhyme with <i>blue</i> , <i>new</i> , and <i>you</i> .
