

## **CONJUNCTIVE ADVERBS**

- Two independent clauses can be joined by using a comma and a coordinating conjunction (fanboy) or a semicolon.
- When creating a compound sentence by joining two independent clauses using a semicolon, a *transitional expression* is often used after the semicolon and is followed by a comma.
- Both *conjunctive adverbs* and *transitional phrases* are considered transitional expressions. They are used to indicate the relationship between the two sentences being joined with a semicolon.

**Example:** Melissa is a great student; in addition, she excels as a lab assistant.

- Conjunctive adverbs are used to show relationships like sequence, contrast, and cause and effect. For example, *also*, *moreover*, and *in addition* are used to add an idea while *however* and *nevertheless* are used to show contrast.
- Becoming familiar with conjunctive adverbs and learning how to use them and punctuate them, helps you avoid run-on sentences.
